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CHAIRMAN:

Again, if anyone who is going to testify on behalf of the OEC or HSP, if you were not sworn in, we need to swear them in. Please stand to be sworn in by our stenographer.

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9 WITNESSES SWORN EN MASSE:

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CHAIRMAN:

Thank you very much. And with that, HSP Gaming, you may begin.

ATTORNEY SKLAR

Thank you. My name is Sklar, S-K-L-A-R. The fact is, is Sugarhouse's Petition to Modify its Gaming Floor. The whole purpose of this Petition, hoping everyone recognizes and sees by the numbers that Sugarhouse desperately needs additional table games, and that is --- it really is the focus of this petition, and I think you'll see on the PowerPoint, the numbers scream more tables. So with that, Wendy?

MS. HAMILTON:

Thank you, Michael. Good morning, Mr. Chairman and members of the Board. Wendy Hamilton,

H-A-M-I-L-T-O-N, General Manager. And with me I have
Rose Cook. I'll spell it for you, too. C-O-O-K. Our
Vice President of Table Games. I'm going to go
through these slides, and Rose is available for any
questions that you may have about the table games
operation.

Sugarhouse has the least number of table games in the State of Pennsylvania. And despite that, we're the highest in March in our total table games within the state.

Our average win per unit in the month of March was over \$4,800 versus the state average of just over \$2,000 win per unit per day. So we feel very strongly, as Michael said, there's definitely a demand at our property for additional table games. During our peak hours, it's very difficult to get a seat. It's impossible for two friends to get a seat next to each other. You know, there's a segment of business that we're missing out on, because our table limits tend to be higher than some of the folks in our region who want to play.

You have in your packets a floor plan, our current floor plan OP-2. And you also have our proposed floor plan, OP-3. There are two ways in which we come up with additional square footage that

we need to add table games. And this really is true, this year, that 777 square feet from our current Refinery Restaurant operation, and certainly the gaming phase. And number two, we reconfigure much of our slot floor, straighten out the curves, make the layout more efficient, and gain some space that way as well. So that in the end we end up with exactly the same number of slot machines, 1,602, and 10 additional table games, 53 versus today's 43.

On slide seven, you can see the break out of what we project those additional tables will be, predominantly Blackjack and a new game. We'll submit Texas Hold-Em, which we just submitted for, as well as one additional Mini Bacc, Pai Gow Poker and Roulette games.

The position of the ten tables, that means about 70 new jobs get created, 50 of them are dealers, and about 20 of them are supervision. And we're projecting the majority of the summer to do this work on a Monday and Friday basis, keeping the operation open on weekends, and anticipate completion in the October time frame. What questions can we answer for you?

CHAIRMAN:

Before we move on to the Board questions,

Office of Enforcement Counsel (OEC), do you have questions and do you have a presentation?

ATTORNEY MILLER:

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We have general questions, and we don't have a presentation. We don't object to this, Mr. Chairman, over the slot machines and a small area of the Refinery Restaurant to affect the patrons' ability to get a good meal at Sugarhouse Casino.

With regard to the Board on this, we had our people out there, and we just think that based on the numbers, we agree that Sugarhouse could use more 12 table games.

CHAIRMAN:

Thank you. With that, questions from the Board? Yes, Commissioner Sojka?

MR. SOJKA:

I just want to make sure I understood something you said, and that is because you have this limited number of tables, people can't sit together, you have a really significant win per table. If you 21 | had more tables and seating is better and everything, that you suggested that you might be able to lower the Is that a possibility? And still fit your limit. business model, that there may be more, pardon the expression, affordable table games, because we do hear complaints that it costs quite a bit to buy in and sit down at a table game in Pennsylvania. Would you be able to lower the volume a little bit?

MS. HAMILTON:

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It certainly moves us in that direction. It's unclear whether this addition of ten gets us to that point, but it certainly gets us closer to that point, if it takes us closer to that goal.

MR. SOJKA:

Good. And that helps us understand something that, I guess, is pretty obvious, and that is as long as table games are sort of overwhelmed and saturated, they're simply are a good business model to 14 have a buy-in as high as possible. And if you get a little bit --- and this helps us understand other casinos, if you get down a little bit in terms of saturation, it's a good business model to lower the volume of cost.

MS. HAMILTON:

Sure. I mean, depending on again there are some cases where you can --- yeah, increase overall revenue by opening your business to a greater number of people.

MR. SOJKA:

Thank you.

CHAIRMAN:

Commissioner Ginty?

MR. GINTY:

My recollection is that although you're doing very, very well in table games, that slot play is below Pennsylvania average. Is there a reason that you can put your finger on?

MS. HAMILTON:

I know you're aware of these numbers, but Sugarhouse for a month now that consistently has the highest slot win per unit in the state for the first time for the week ending May 1st. We have highest slot in the state, so I think that, you know, speaks to the fact that the slot business is a very database, is extremely competitive on the east coast, and so when you look at the database versus competitors who are dealing with 500,000-plus active customers who they're speaking to you on a weekly, monthly basis, you have to look at people are talking to --- this Monday, next Saturday, you know, Friday night. And so it's seven months that Sugarhouse has been open we have consistently grown our slot revenue.

I think it's very telling that for the first time two weeks ago we did have the highest slot win per unit in the state. We're a small operation,

11 1 but slot business is growing. You know, we're very 2 pleased with the way it has grown. Seven months we've 3 been there, and I have few concerns that it will continue to grow. 5 MR. GINTY: 6 Thank you. CHAIRMAN: I have a couple questions to the table 8 limits. What is your lowest Blackjack limit? 10 MS. HAMILTON: Well, it depends on the time of day. 11 12 CHAIRMAN: So take me to the lowest, lowest table 13 14 limit in the lowest play time of the week, Sunday 15 evening, 2:00 a.m., Monday morning. 16 MS. COOK: Sunday morning, 2:00 a.m., the lowest 17 table minimum would be \$25. 18 19 CHAIRMAN: 20 Okay. So again, ---. 21 MS. COOK: 22 Yeah, if you want to talk about Tuesday 23 morning at 7:00 a.m. with Blackjack game, we will go $24 \mid ---$ able to hold \$15 for the people. Three card

25 Poker, that's \$10. Our Roulette would be \$10 and our

12 Craps would be \$10. 1 2 CHAIRMAN: 3 Okay. So the lowest during a general week for Blackjack would be \$15? 5 MS. COOK: 6 Yes. And that's all on those hours. 7 CHAIRMAN: Sure. Friday, Saturday evening peak 8 hours, what's the minimum? 10 MS. COOK: 11 The lowest minimum would be \$50. 12 CHAIRMAN: Pardon me? 13 14 MS. COOK: 15 \$50 minimum on Blackjack. 16 CHAIRMAN: 17 Okay. Let's go back just to your OP-2 current floor plan and the OP-3 proposed floor plan. 18 I just want to get a sense of where those tables are 19 20 going --- and Wendy, if you can orient me, where's the 21 river and where's the porte-cochere? 22 MS. HAMILTON: 23 Okay. So the porte-cochere's on the left

24 side of the page, the river is on the right side of 25 the page. Are you looking at OP-2 right now?

CHAIRMAN:

Yes. Yeah.

MS. HAMILTON:

The porte-cochere on the left, river on the right, so far east end of the property on the right you see the white area and the green, that's where Refinery Restaurant and Bar area.

CHAIRMAN:

Got it.

MS. HAMILTON:

And so the current table pit, there's currently four of them. One in the high limit room on the south side of the property about midway. One just northwest of that, and two that run along the main corridor toward the Refinery Restaurant on the left of the main corridor. So 43 games today reside in those four pits.

CHAIRMAN:

Okay.

MS. HAMILTON:

If you go to OP-3, we continue to have games in the limited pit that one on the south side of the property, one midway. And now you've got still two pits that run forward from the Refinery Restaurant from east to west, and then just west of them are two

14 additional pits and craps pits running north, south. 2 CHAIRMAN: 3 Okay. Thank you. Any other questions? Okay. Anything else from OEC? 5 ATTORNEY MILLER: Just that we recommend that if the Board 6 does approve this, that they place the conditions that we've asked for in our answer to the 12 conditions that we'd ask that you include those conditions. 10 CHAIRMAN: 11 Thank you. And I assume, Mr. Sklar, you 12 want the PowerPoint put into the record also? 13 ATTORNEY SKLAR 14 Please. 15 CHAIRMAN: 16 Okay. That concludes the hearing for HSP 17 Gaming.
