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3 PRESIDING OFFICER: Good morning. 4 Linda Lloyd, and I'm the Presiding Officer assigned 5 by the Board to conduct this portion of the 6 Category-1 License Renewal Hearing for PID, LLC, 7 d/b/a Presque Isle Downs Casino. Before we begin, 8 if we could all please turn off, or at least to 9 vibrate, our cell phones and other electronic 10 devices so we don't interrupt our speakers. I would 11 like to remind everyone that this proceeding is 12 being recorded today by a Court Reporter who's 13 sitting down to my right and is also being recorded 14 on video and live streamed to the Board's website at 15 this time. If you would like to watch this again in 16 the future, it will be posted to our website as well. 17

As Presiding Officer, I call this hearing to order. The date is Wednesday, September 25th. The time is 10:32 and the location is the Summit Township Building at 1230 Town Hall Road in Erie, Pennsylvania.

The Race Horse Development and Gaming Act, as amended, requires at Section 1326 that an operator's license shall be subject to renewal by

the Board every five years. This License Renewal Hearing is convened by the Board pursuant to the mandate found in Section 1205(b) of the Gaming act that requires, as part of the renewal process, a public hearing to be held in a municipality where the license facility is located. This public hearing was advertised on the board's website, announced by the board at public board meetings, and advertised in local newspapers.

Board Members present today for the hearing are, to my immediate right, our Chair, Denise Smyler, and to my left, Commissioner Frank Dermody, and Commissioner Fran Regan.

The hearing will begin with a presentation by PID, and after that presentation, the Board's Office of Enforcement Counsel and the Board will have an opportunity to ask questions of PID's witnesses. After the conclusion of that presentation, the OEC will make its presentation, and again, Counsel for PID and our Board Members will have opportunity to ask questions of those witnesses.

After the close of the testimony and evidence from both parties, those witnesses who have registered to speak today at today's Public Input

Hearing will have their name called and will have approximately five minutes each to provide their thoughts regarding the renewal. Following the close of public comment, PID and OEC will each have the opportunity to provide a short closing statement.

So let's begin by having all witnesses from Presque Isle down and OEC who will testify here today stand, raise your right hand and be sworn by our Court Reporter.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you. And PID, take it away and if you can, state and spell your name first time you speak for our Court Reporter, he does have some spellings, but not all of them.

ATTORNEY HAYES: Director Lloyd,
Chair Smyler, Commissioner Regan and Commissioner
Dermody, morning and welcome to Erie County. My
name is Kevin Hayes. That's K-E-V-I-N, H-A-Y-E-S,
of the Sabre Law Firm in Scranton, and I have the
pleasure of representing Category-1 Slot Machine
Licensee PID, LLC, doing business as, Presque Isle
Downs and Casino.

As Director Lloyd indicated, Presque Isle Downs will offer a presentation this morning as part of the public input proceeding. Here are the topics that we will discuss during our case in chief. First, we are going to provide you with an overview of the property's licensing history as a racetrack casino, as well as a description of its current operations under the ownership of Churchill Downs Incorporated. We will describe the capital investment that Churchill Downs has made this property since acquiring it in 2019.

Next, the management team of Presque Isle Downs is going to describe the initiatives and strategies that it has implemented to develop a diverse workforce and to create opportunity for women and minority-owned business enterprises to transact business with Presque Isle Downs. We will also describe the benefits that are offered to Presque Isle Downs employees and the successes that the property has enjoyed in retaining its employees in what you will hear is a challenging labor market.

Today, we will also describe Presque
Isle Downs' effort to address responsible gaming and
alcohol management at the property, as well as the
measures that have been taken to prevent minors from

accessing the licensed facility and to prevent unattended minors.

We will provide a summary of the economic impact and the tax revenues generated by this property to the benefit of the Commonwealth, Erie County, Summit Township and the horse racing industry. We will provide you with a description of how Presque Isle Downs has honored its commitment to Pennsylvania's horse racing industry. And lastly, we will describe Presque Isle Downs community outreach initiatives and the meaningful impact that this property has had on several non-profit organizations in the area.

We have a number of representatives from Presque Isle Downs, Churchill Downs and Churchill Downs here today to offer testimony and answer your questions. At this time, I'm going to introduce someone who you are very familiar with, Presque Isle Down's Vice President and General Manager, Gary Hendricks, who will introduce the members of his team and then begin today's presentation. Gary?

MR. HENDRICKS: Thank you. Chair Smyler, Director Linda - Director Lloyd, I'm sorry. Commissioners, thank you for joining us today, and

the staff, appreciate you coming to our little
corner of the Commonwealth today. Hope you enjoyed
your visit yesterday. Excited to see the race and
all that. My name is Gary Hendricks, G-A-R-Y,
H-E-N-D-R-I-C-K-S, And we have a fairly large
contention of employees here that I kind of wanted
to share with you.

Jill Snyder, who just sits down
beside me is our Director of Human Resources, you'll
hear from her. We also have, in the back behind me,
we have Michael Meagher, who's our Executive vice
President, of Churchill Downs, excuse me. Sitting
beside him is Oz Sharia (phonetic), one of our
Counsel outside. On the other side, Weaver Asconia
(phonetic), another counsel from the Corporate
Office.

Matt Ennis, who is my Senior Director of Operations, who is a longtime employee. A lot of these people that are here today are actually day-one employees.

Jennifer Seed (phonetic), my Director of Marketing.

Jake Graff (phonetic), my Director of Finance, Ross

Douklist (phonetic), who is our Controller. Terry

Schneider in the back there is our Director of

Compliance. Beside her is Nicole Ford, our Internal

Auditor. Then we have Bill Sireg (phonetic), our
Director of Facilities, and Clark Metzger

(phonetic), our Director of security.

So all kind of here to observe today. We welcome their presence. So I'll move forward here. So this represents a timeline of events here in Erie through 2019 when Churchill assumed the ownership of the casino. It's presented in house against the backdrop that makes one of the most beautiful pictures of property, with the view of the lake in the background. It's a shame that it's grayed out. It is one of the really, it's just a grandiose property. It's a beautiful area.

We're showing some key moments in our history, including our grand opening in 2007 and Churchill coming in January of 2019. I myself joined the property a few years later in September of 22, after having served as GM in Nemacolin. I've been a GM now in Pennsylvania since 2016. Later in the presentation, we'll share some events that have taken place since Churchill came in.

So here we have some photos of the property showing the diversity of gaming operation here. We have 1525 slot machines, 34 table games, 15 hybrid seats, which make up three of those games.

We have our sportsbook area, our one mile Tepeta

Surface Racetrack that we all saw yesterday. As I

was mentioning yesterday, it was recognized as one

of the safest tracks in the country with that

synthetic surface, and I'll have quite a bit more to

speak about racing a little bit later on.

So, dining at Presque Isle, we have a variety of restaurants for our patrons to enjoy.

This includes Bourbon & Brew, casual dining restaurant. LaBonne Vie, our higher-end steakhouse, which has been recognized locally by Yelp and Opentable as a premium dining service here in town. And we recently opened a cafe, which is a grab-and-go concept pizza, those kind of things, or patrons to give them another option.

So quite a few options to choose from and then the lower-right corner is the center bar, which is a fabulous place. There's a lot of game tops around there for video poker, but it's just a great place to sit and enjoy the environment.

So Churchill Downs, everybody's familiar with the race, operates 27 properties across 14 states. This includes six thoroughbred tracks, of which Presque Isle is one, three harness tracks and one training track. The Kentucky Derby

- 1 is the longest running sport event in North America.
- 2 | Earlier this year ran the 150th race, one of the
- 3 | most exciting finishes that I've ever seen -. It's
- 4 just incredible
- 5 | Since Churchill came in 2019, we've
- 6 | had \$17 million yearly spent in capital investment
- 7 | in the property. As I was pointed out yesterday,
- 8 some of the newest projects we just laid down new
- 9 carpeting last year in November. Just before that,
- 10 | we replaced all our slot chairs, which you have 1500
- 11 chairs moving in and out of the casino is always an
- 12 | exciting day.
- We are currently bringing in within
- 14 | the next two or three days, we have some slot
- 15 | machines coming in. We have 60 machines coming in
- 16 | this fall, another couple million dollars. It's not
- 17 included in that \$17,000,000. And we also open that
- 18 food outlet to give our patriots the other option
- 19 | with the InCafe.
- 20 So going on to talk about diversity.
- 21 We have a commitment to diversity within our
- 22 | purchasing and our employment practices. I'm going
- 23 to speak a little bit to the purchasing side. We
- 24 | recently partnered with a company named Supplier.io.
- 25 | They're a company that specializes in identifying

minority women-owned businesses. What we found is that just relying on businesses itself wasn't necessarily reliable.

So we brought this group in as a company. They started with us in quarter one, and while you can see that we had a few efforts in that lower-right table to kind of get a little bit better spend, having them start quarter one, the quarter two results of 2004 nearly doubled the prior year at 6.8 percent. And it's a trend that we're continuing to grow with this group. It's a really exciting event - opportunity here for us to expand that.

With that, I'm going to turn it over to Jill to talk about employment.

MS. SNYDER: Good morning, Chair Smyler, Director and Commissioners and staff, my name is Jill Snyder, J-I-L-L, S-N-Y-D-E-R. We consider diversity to be a crucial part of our success, and our commitment can not only be found in our plan, but in our workforce. We are committed to attracting qualified, diverse candidates by sharing all external postings with our diversity contacts.

These contacts include, but are not limited to, our Veterans Administration, Mission Empower, the JFK and Booker T. Washington Centers,

CareerLink, our local schools to include high school, college and technical schools, etcetera. evaluate applicants using job-related requirements and prohibit discrimination. All management participates in diversity training; with this year's scheduled for November. This training will help management recognize that we all have biases and how those biases can influence decisions and interactions with others.

Our intent is to pursue inclusion of all people, which strengthens PID and our pursuit for excellence. 34.6 percent of our employees are women, with this trend continuing through our executive team. The majority of us on the executive team are not only day-one employees, but have been promoted from within.

In order to maintain a diverse pool of applicants, we rely not only on our partnership efforts with our contacts, but our community outreach as well. This includes attendance at local job fairs, job boards, and providing interviewing practice and feedback at local schools. Internally, we work with our team members to align their schedules to fit the bus routes and offer a referral -. With the help of these efforts, our total ethnic

1 minority percentage exceeds Erie County's by four
2 points.

While we are committed to finding qualified, diverse applicants, we are also committed to our current diverse workforce. It is our mission that all our team members feel valued and respected. Earlier this year, we conducted an engagement survey requesting feedback from all team members. We used that information to create action plans for improvement.

We are currently conducting a pulse survey to evaluate how effective those action plans are through the eyes of our team members. We have spent over \$100 million in payroll taxes and benefits since 2019 when we joined the Churchill family. With 93 percent of our employees being PA residents, that money is reinvested into our local economy.

We have a rich, comprehensive benefit package. Our employee stock purchase plan is a unique benefit allowing all team members, including frontline, to become equity owners in our company. This is a benefit full time and part-time team members can partake in as long as they've been employed for 30 days and work at least 21 hours per

1 | week. We offer a 401K plan where you are 100

2 percent vested in the company match on day one.

This match is 100 percent up to three percent and

4 | half of the fourth and fifth percent.

We celebrate our team members often.

Short-term disability. We have an Employee
Assistance Program that is not only a resource for
both full time and part-time team members, but their
family members as well. Next week, we are hosting a
health fair with local vendors offering flu shots,
mental health awareness, financial wellbeing, an
opportunity for our team members to donate blood.

Our director of food and beverage partnered with one of our Nepali team members to prepare goat curry for us all to enjoy. It was so successful that we have plans to do something similar again, first quarter 2025. Hiring an inclusive, diverse workforce and making sure our workforce is valued and treated with respect is something we pride ourselves on.

MR. MEAGHER: So while we're committed to diversity in our employees, we're also committed to our compulsive gaming and responsible alcohol service. Employees are trained in new-hire

orientation and have annual CCTV training refresher
for all employees, as well as events to raise
awareness, which I have a couple of examples in the
next slide, for items like - such as responsible
gaining education, which is actually occurring and
ongoing.

RAMP is the approved program from the PLCB, utilized for service training. In addition to RAMP's training occurring for all service employees, every service, we also train all gaming management, table games and slots, and all security staff, operators or security officers and above within six months of hire. Employees are required to recertify this every two years.

example of some things that we pass out. That this is actually done by Terry on the property. A word search and a questionnaire that employees are asked to take part in during this Responsible Gaming month. Another key component of responsible gaming enforces our minor prevention and underage unattended minors. You can see several examples of what we've done at the property.

It's a circular program where the key component is you see something, say something. We

have signage all through the building, both on the exterior with the, it's illegal leave children unattended sign, with the girl on it, and I believe that was actually picked up by the Board as part of the drive that you guys did as well, or something very similar. We have rack cards inside the casino that have this, and as you heard yesterday, we have a recurring message every two hours that we play. A former employee speaks to everybody, reminding them that it's illegal to leave children in the casino.

We have had a few incidents at the property, but it's been significantly less since we put all these initiatives into place. Sorry. And the incidents that we do have resolved most of the things -.

So the economic impact since the property opened, nearly \$1.5 billion in tax revenues have been generated. The support property tax relief in the local community and horse racing since Churchill Downs has taken ownership, that's \$335 million.

So this is a quick snapshot of the competitive landscape. It's a little unique in this part of the state in that we face pressure from not only within the state - casinos, but also from Ohio

and New York, which has been a challenge. Ohio went live with sports betting earlier in January of '23 and had a major impact on us. It's one of the impacts. I'll show you in just a minute.

The smaller map shows about a five mile radius around the property. And we've identified upwards of 150 skill games in that area. To put that in context, I shared this with a few people yesterday. We've seen estimates of upwards of 100,000 skill games across the Commonwealth. If you think about the casino floor being around 1,500 games, that represents an additional 67 casinos across the Commonwealth. In addition to the regulated casinos, so they definitely do have an impact on us.

I'll share a few pictures with you and what I really want to call out is the other one, Lake Erie Games 777, and notice their Facebook or a snapshot; biggest gaming floor in Erie with 30 of the hottest and most popular skill games. These are no longer just a few places in the back of a restaurant or bar. There, in the one below, Miele Plumbing has been turned into parlor as well. These are actually small scale casinos.

So what we have here is revenue

trends, essentially since Churchill came in, but showing some of the key things that happened during that time. 2018 ,PA operators began to accept retail sports wagers in 2019. In July, we began taking retail sports. In December, we began to do online sports wagers. And in 2020, we began to accept interactive wagers.

In 2022, New York operators began to accept retail and online sports. In '23, as I just said, Ohio began to accept theirs. In '23, we began to see really expansive growth in skill based games in '24 that has continued. You can see the revenue trend is slightly down. Of course, 2020 is a bit of an outlier because of the COVID.

So this is a next page is a page that we shared with several legislators showing the effect of the tax rate. What this is, is over the course of the years, we've seen our revenue trend down. This is slot revenue. It's driven by the \$10 million flat LSA fee, which paid in full during that COVID shutdown by the way.

We've removed COVID in 2020 on this slide, it is significantly skews the data, but what this represents is slot gaming taxes, including the admin fee and the LSA, we divide it into our slot

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revenue. This is before any other expenses,

including payroll tax, sales and use tax, property

tax, racing, those kind of things which would

actually drive that number up fairly significantly.
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So go on to racing. Since Churchill ownership, nearly \$69 million in purses have been paid out over the course of 377 racing days. In our '24 meet, which ends later in October, we expect to have 76 days of live racing. Our 16th Masters Stake Race was just held last Friday with a purse of \$300,000. We actually have four stakes during that. The Masters is 300,000 a mile, 100,000 for the two smaller races in front of that.

But this was a record day for us, first time we've done it on a Friday, we drove nearly \$2.7 billion in handle. The prior record was \$1.9 million. So it was a huge day. Very, very successful. For the first time, we also partnered with Parx Casino to tie into their Pennsylvania Derby, which happened on Saturday.

We offered a Pick Four and a Daily

Double against their two - two of their races and

two of our races, which performed very well here.

This was the first for Pennsylvania racing, and the

response that this initiative received from the

Racing Commission that we're thrilled to see this
just to try to breathe some new life into that

product. And we continue to look at opportunities

to change post times, those kind of things, to get

the public more involved. We're actually looking at

some changes for next year, which we have to in

front of that, but always looking for things.

So our community outreach, this represents cash disbursement. It doesn't include volunteer efforts, employees who volunteer with the fire departments, those kind of things, which we have a lot of that. We also have a lot of in-kind donations that we do. We'll give dinner for two and LBV or dinner for two at Bourbon & Brew. This just represents cash. Some of the people that we've worked with. Combined donations since Churchill came in, is \$1.4 million.

The logos that I put on this page represent some of the more exciting groups that we've worked with. Erie Gives, this year, Community Giving Day, raised \$9.7 million. It's their record for that day as well. They were also recognized at that event for being number three in community charity days in the country. So they're very excited about that.

What this does is they represent a group that then takes the money that we donate to them and gives that out, distributes it to 500 other charities. So it allows us to reach many more people than we could ever manage on our own. I actually gave a speech for them at their UPMC ballpark last week, thanking them and for their efforts. We've been working with them for multiple - for over ten years, doing that program.

Warriors of Washington is another organization with which we work. Every year they take a group of veterans to tour D.C. and you'll be hearing from one of their members here. We allow them to utilize our parking lot which keeps their cars under surveillance while they take a bus to D.C. One of my favorites also is the Boys and Girls Club of Erie. I'll switch over to some photos here. You can see that they participate with -.

So I've done that, managed to do that two years in a row. Next year will be Jay Craft, he doesn't know that. But a couple other groups that we've done there on the page, most notably, the Veterans Miracle Center is another group that we support. We rotate every month at different - a different group through this program to raise money

1 for them.

MR. HENDRICKS: Not at this point.

We always look for an opportunity. We recently

opened the InCafe and while we continue to evaluate other options for the casino, we could expand into the old buffet with potentially a coffee shop or something. We're waiting to kind of see how the volume goes. It's difficult to turn long plan term capital strategy until we understand the state of the market specifically.

ATTORNEY TEPPER: And turning to slide number six, are all of these properties both owned and operated by Churchill Downs Incorporated?

MR. HENDRICKS: There are two that are joint ventures, Miami Gaming Valley and the Chicago Rivers at this point are joint ventures.

Chasers in New Hampshire is actually - the building is owned by another entity, but we operate all those properties.

MR. HENDRICKS: Right. Multiple sources, right. We have a lot of online presence, Facebook, Instagram, those kind of things. We also, of course, have direct mail that gets sent out with as well, messaging through that and some amount of television and radio advertising in the local market.

13 CHAIR SMYLER: And the direct mail.

14 That list is based on what folks that have been at

15 the casino?

MR. HENDRICKS: Yeah. Players that are signed up and if not on the self-exclusion, of course, and have opted in for that.

CHAIR SMYLER: And the executive team, what's the percentage of females or minorities on the executive team?

MS. SNYDER: Females is 40 percent.

Thank you. Minorities, I don't have that number in

front of me.

MR. HENDRICKS: Non-executive team.

CHAIR SMYLER: You can get back to us on that. And with regard to - I think you're doing a great job with your outreach Board, including minorities and diverse employees, but did you ever think about expanding it from local schools to regional or statewide? Because there are folks that aren't in the local area that might want to come to Erie, believe it or not.

MR. HENDRICKS: One of the difficulties have is that if you think of Erie is the community right outside of Erie is very, very rural. Not very diverse at all. It's like getting down into Pittsburgh, it represents a challenge. We have gone outside of that market. As an example, my director of finance is from Buffalo. we go outside that market for people that we can bring in and move in, and we're always willing to talk to people. We always look for opportunity.

CHAIR SMYLER: Well, I know Cheyney
University's President is interested in that, being
more of his folks get involved in the gaming
industry. So you may want to reach out to the CU or
some others. Just a thought.

MR. HENDRICKS: We've been to - we do job fairs at some of the universities outside, like

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BY ATTORNEY TEPPER:

- Q. Good morning, Corporal. Can you please state your name, spell your last name?
 - A. My name is Corporal Brian Knarr. It's spelled B-R-I-A-N, K-N-A-R-R.
- Q. Can you please introduce yourself?
- A. Sure. Again, my name is Brian Knarr.

 Pennsylvania State Police, and my job title is

 Presque Isle Downs Supervisor in the State Police
- Q. Can you please describe your career with the Pennsylvania State Police?
 - A. I've been employed with the Pennsylvania State Police for 20 years. I've been a Corporal since December of 2018. I've been in Presque Isle Downs now for about two and-a-half years. Before that, 20 years, I a lot of 18 years was on the road, working the road. Before being promoted to Corporal, I served as a field training officer, working on the road, training new cadets that come out of the academy.

I serv as a temporary criminal investigator in that capacity, basically a detective criminal investigator. I was on the tactical mounted unit as a field rider for two years. Some of the things I was involved with, but one of the things I was - while as a member of the tactical mounted unit, I participated in the security of the 2016 Democratic National Convention.

I was involved in the 2014 Poconos manhunt for Aaron Freeman, about ten years ago, actually, and I was also involved in security with the 2015 Pope Francis visit in Philadelphia.

- Q. And what are your current job duties?
- A. As a Corporal, I act as the in a supervisory capacity for the troopers that are assigned to Casino. I conduct some of the things I do conduct yearly member performance evaluations for our troopers. I correct and approve the trooper's reports, investigative reports, and assignment reports. I'm also the custodial officer for our evidence room and I maintain our fleet of cars that we use for the casino, and I also help assist with any calls as needed.
- Q. And what is the role of the Pennsylvania
 State Police Bureau of Gaming Enforcement at Presque

Isle Downs and Casino?

- A. Our role is to conduct investigations pertaining to Title IV investigations, Pennsylvania criminal offenses, as well as property preservation. Additionally, we oversee operations pertaining to the security of transactional money in and out via transport, when the money truck comes every other day.
- Q. And can you please provide the

 Pennsylvania State Police's jurisdiction at Presque

 Isle Downs and Casino?
- A. Our jurisdiction has changed over the last six years because we're primarily covered by Pennsylvania State Police Erie station, located in Lawrence Park, which is just outside of Erie.

 Therefore, this change provided that all incidents are reported to the Bureau of Gaming Enforcement Office for investigation. If we need assistance, we can call on them at the State Police Erie station for any major incidents like homicides, anything like that.
- Q. And who's primarily jurisdiction over the parking lot?
- A. That was explained, but we do. We handle most minor crashes and now, more importantly, we

address all minors in vehicles on the property and we handle those.

- Q. And can you please describe the
 Pennsylvania State Police Bureau of Gaming
 Enforcement's working relationship with the local
 PSP station?
- A. Our current working relationship with Erie Station is great for any necessary -. We would have we also try to provide assistance for them as necessary. It's a good working relationship because at least seven of our officers that have worked in Erie and know the people there and everything, I myself, work in PSP Erie. So it's a very good working relationship.
- Q. And can you please describe the working relationship between the Pennsylvania State Police Bureau of Gaming Enforcement and Presque Isle Downs and Casino employees?
- A. Through our command structure, we have a very good working relationship at all levels of casino employees, which bodes well for investigations, determine clarity and assistance in identifying suspects and actors. We try to keep a presence on the floor. We take periodic walks throughout inside the property. Can't talk too much

- to the employees because they're busy, we're busy,

 but we just maintain that presence. We know that

 they feel comfortable with us and it does bode for a

 working relationship.
 - Q. And can you please describe the working relationship between the Pennsylvania State Police Bureau of Enforcement and the Board's Bureau for Casino Compliance?
 - A. Our relationship is great, especially since we're only separated by the door. The lines of communication are open both ways. The supervisors were able to talk about any and all issues with the members and and further investigation results and related reporting. Very good.
 - Q. Are you familiar with how risk statistics are reported by the Pennsylvania State Police?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. Can you please describe how these statistics are reported?
 - A. We use NIBERS, which is stands for National Incident Based Reporting System. It's a national database, utilized by the FBI being reported through our RMS, which means record management based system. The offenses are

- documented with any and all reporting being made
 through this RMS system. UCR, which Uniform Crime
 Reporting, the system is utilized by our
 - Q. And I understand that these reports are sometimes referred to as Senate Reports. Can you please describe that a little further?
 - A. End of year Senate reports are prepared annually to obtain all arrests being made at our particular location.
 - Q. And how frequently is this information obtained and the report updated?
- A. Annually.

department prior to RMS.

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- Q. What is the last date these statistics
 are available for reported offenses at Presque Isle
 Downs and Casino?
- 17 A. December 31st of 2023.
- Q. And is this information contained therein, subject to editing and revision?
- 20 A. No.
- Q. And can the number offenses be reduced if the case is later determined to be unfounded?
 - A. No, but it should be noted in an unfounded case, we did not make an arrest. We conduct a thorough investigation and we charge as

warranted.

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- Q. I'm going to direct you to what has been provided as OEC Exhibit 1, I believe you have a copy in front of you. Can you identify this document?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. What is this document?
- 7 A. This is arrest statistics from '19 8 through 2023.
 - Q. And does the OEC Exhibit 1 show the actual number of arrests which were prosecuted?
- 11 A. Yes.
- Q. And did you review the arrest statistics
 from Presque Isle Downs from the time period 2019 to
 2023?
- 15 A. Yes.
- Q. And what is the most common criminal
 offense based on the information you can find in OEC
 Exhibit 1?
- A. Every year, defiant trespassing is the most common arrests made at our location. That doesn't include the management and self-excluded suspects.
- Q. And can you say approximately how many thefts are reported on average each month?
- 25 A. This can range depending on any given

- 1 | year, but generally around seven to ten per month.
- 2 | Many of these thefts are gray-area crimes, but it
- 3 | could easily become chargeable offenses, most common
- 4 | being under Pennsylvania Code Title 18 3924, which
- 5 | is theft of property loss, mislead or delivered by
- 6 | mistake, and that's without cooperation of the
- 7 victims.
- Q. And are there a significant number of violent crimes at Presque Isle Downs and Casino?
- 10 A. No.
- Q. Are there significant number of crimes regarding individuals under the age of 21?
- 13 A. What these types of crimes have reduced 14 significantly since changes were made after COVID-15 19.
- Q. And has there been a noticeable increase in any specific findings between 2019 and the present?
- 19 A. No.
- Q. Do you see a pattern in the type of actual offenses that have occurred at Presque Isle Downs and Casino?
- A. No. Nothing sticks out.
- Q. Overall, are the Pennsylvania State
 Police satisfied with the level of cooperation from

- 1 | Presque Isle Downs and Casino employees and the
- 2 | Pennsylvania State Police Trooper Station at the
- 3 | casino?
- 4 A. Absolutely, yes.
- Q. And in your opinion, are there any issues
- 6 or concerns which would negatively impact Presque

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- 5 Q. Good morning. Can you please state your 6 name and spell your last name?
 - A. Daniel Rossman, R-O-S-S-M-A-N.
 - Q. And can you please introduce yourself?
 - A. My name is Dan Rossman. I work for the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board. I'm the Casino Compliance Supervisor at Presque Isle Downs
- Q. Can you please describe your employment history with the Board?
- A. I've been employed with the Gaming
 Control Board for 16 years, 11 years as a
 supervisor. Prior to that, I was a Casino
 Compliance Representative.
- Q. And what are your job duties as the

 Bureau of Casino Compliance supervisor assigned to

 Presque Isle Downs?
- A. I oversee the monitoring of casino
 operations at Presque Isle Downs, and manage the
 online PGCB office.
- Q. Can you describe the role of the Bureau of Casino Compliance and a slot machine licensee?

A. We monitor the daily operation; making sure personnel, employees and departments are abiding by their internal controls and standard operating procedures, along with PGCB regulations.

We also investigate any patron complaints, suspicious activity, employee misconduct issues, which can include procedure violations and gaming licensing. We assist any patron that requests information about problem gambling and document any self-excluded patron found on the gaming floor for violating the gambling ban.

- Q. And how has the role of the Bureau of Casino Compliance changed since the control change of control from El Dorado Resorts to Presque Isle Presque Isle Downs as to Churchill, since the Board reissued the license in 2019?
- A. The Presque Isle Downs PGCB office role has stayed the same. The transition from El Dorado Resorts to Churchill was seamless.
- Q. Can you please describe the level and scope of access which the Bureau of Casino Compliance has at Presque Isle Downs and Casino?
- A. Our office has better access to all areas with no issues.
- 25 Q. Does this include the surveillance room?

- 1 A. Yes.
- 2 Q. The count room?
- 3 A. Yes.
- 4 Q. And Central Control Computer System Room?
- 5 A. Yes.

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- Q. And briefly turning to the central control computer system room, have there been any connectivity issues between the central control computer system and Presque Isle Downs?
- 10 A. No.
- Q. Can you please describe the Bureau of
 Casino Compliance's interaction with the Department
 of Revenue, who controls the central control
 computer system?
 - A. We generally work with the Department of Revenue auditors when they perform their onsite gaming or audits and we give them any assistance needed. There's no problems.
 - Q. Can you please discuss the relationship between the Bureau of Casino Compliance and the onsite Pennsylvania State Police at Presque Isle Downs?
- A. We often share information regarding casino incidents. We have a good working relationship.

Q. Can you please explain the way in which the Bureau of Casino Compliance interacts with patrons of Presque Isle Downs?

- A. Casino compliance representatives watch the gaming floor and often speak to patrons gambling. They assist patrons that wish to sign up for self-exclusion, investigate complaints and answer any gaming inquiries.
 - Q. And how are patron complaints handled?
- A. Patron complaints are fully investigated by the casino compliance representative by first interviewing the patron that has the grievance. Then the investigation leads to speaking to any witnesses or employees involved, then reviewing surveillance coverage or any coverage, and any electronic evidence, if applicable.

Casino compliance representative documents the investigation and admits - and submits the findings to me for review. At the inclusion of the investigation, the patrons are in contact by phone or email with the results.

- Q. Can you please describe the relationship between the Board's Bureau of Casino Compliance and Presque Isle Downs staff?
- 25 A. The PGCB office has a cooperative and

- 1 | professional relationship with Presque Isle Downs.
 - Q. And does Presque Isle Downs been cooperative in the compliance reviews conducted by the Bureau of Casino Compliance?
- 5 A. Yes.

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- Q. As the Casino Compliance Supervisor
 assigned to Presque Isle Downs, are you familiar
 with the regulatory issues which occur at the
 casino?
- 10 A. Yes, I am.
- 11 Q. And what are the most common regulatory
 12 issues that press violence.
 - A. The most common violations are procedure violations that normally occur with table games and draw team employees. The violations are generally caused by employee error.
- Q. And in your opinion, are there any issues or concerns which would negatively impact Presque

 Isle Downs suitability for continued licensure?
- 20 A. No.
- 21 <u>ATTORNEY TEPPER:</u> Thank you. We have 22 no further questions.
- PRESIDING OFFICER: Mr. Hayes?

Can you please state your 16 17 name and spell your last name for the record? 18 Α. Good morning. My name is Katlyn Tortorice. That's T-O-R-T-O-R-I-C-E. 19 20 Q. And can you please introduce yourself? 21 I am an Investigator for the Pennsylvania 22 Gaming Control Board's BIE. I'm also the case agent 23 at Presque Isle Downs Casino. 24 And can you please describe your 0. 25 employment history with the Board?

- A. I've been employed with the Board for over 15 years. The first five I spent as a casino compliance rep at Rivers Casino, the last ten as an investigator and I was selected to case agent in January of 2019.
- Q. Now, what are your job duties as an Investigator with the BIE and as the assigned case agent?
- A. I conduct background investigations on individuals or companies attempting to hold or renew licensure with the gaming controller, in order to conduct business with, provide services to own or even just work at Pennsylvania.
- Q. And as part of your duties as an Investigator with the BIE, did you conduct an investigation into PID, LLC, which does business as, Presque Isle Downs and Casino, for the renewal of its Category-1 Slot Machine License?
 - A. Yes.

- Q. And can you please describe the scope of a typical casino renewal investigation?
 - A. The renewal period would consist of a time frame for when the applicant's license was previously approved up through the time when that license is renewed. Typically speaking, it is a

1 five-year period.

- Q. Can you please give me some examples of the areas of the BIE looks at during a renewal investigation?
- A. Yeah. We look at tax compliance, credit
 and litigation history, criminal history, along with
 any non-gaming or other gaming licensure held by the
 applicant, including regulatory compliance.
- 9 Additionally, for individuals, we complete a network 10 analysis to verify every asset and liability held by 11 the applicant.
 - Q. And what tools does the BIE utilize to examine these areas?
 - A. We have several database searches that we use. They include JNET, Accurint, PACER and TrueView. We process a FOIA through the FBI. We conduct local police checks with police jurisdictions. Additionally, any other Internet search that the investigator deems necessary. Some of those include sanctions list, the Pennsylvania Department list and the New Jersey Prohibited Vendor Report.
 - Q. And all those suitability investigations remain ongoing, at this time, as the renewal investigation into the Licensee and its associated

- 2 A. Yes.
- 3 Q. Was PID, LLC cooperative during the
- 4 renewal investigation?
- 5 A. Yes, they were.
- 6 Q. Did the BIE discover any areas of
- 7 | interest during the investigation?
 - A. No, we did not.
- 9 Q. And in your opinion, are there any issues
 10 which would negatively impact PID, LLC's suitability
 11 for continued licensure?
- 12 A. No.
- 13 <u>ATTORNEY TEPPER:</u> We have no further
- 14 questions.
- PRESIDING OFFICER: Mr. Hayes?
- 16 <u>ATTORNEY HAYES:</u> No questions. Thank
- 17 you.

- 18 PRESIDING OFFICER: Any questions
- 19 from Board Members?
- 20 CHAIR SMYLER: No questions. Thank

They have been provided to the 13 parties, OEC and PID Counsel. 14 15 (Whereupon, Hearing Exhibit 1, Written Public 16 Comment, was marked for identification and 17 admitted.) (Whereupon, Hearing Exhibit 2, Written Public 18 Comment, was marked for identification and 19 20 admitted.) 21 (Whereupon, Hearing Exhibit 3, Written Public 22 Comment, was marked for identification and 23 admitted.) 24 (Whereupon, Hearing Exhibit 4, Written Public 25 Comment, was marked for identification and

65 1 admitted.) 2 3 PRESIDING OFFICER: So we will now 4 begin with the public comment portion of the 5 hearing. As I call your name, please come forward to the microphone and on the podium, and each 6 7 speaker should begin their remarks by stating and 8 spelling their name for the Court Reporter. You 9 will have about five minutes for your remarks, and 10 if you're getting close to that, I'll let you know. 11 If you have registered to speak today, if you could 12 stand and raise your right hand to be sworn by the 13 Court Reporter. Oh, good, that matches the number 14 that I have, three. 15 16 (WHEREUPON, WITNESSES SWORN EN MASSE.) 17 18 PRESIDING OFFICER: And we'll start 19 with Anthony Davis. He's a Local Government 20 Representative. Come forward to the podium. 21 22 ANTHONY W. DAVIS,

23 CALLED AS A WITNESS IN THE FOLLOWING PROCEEDING, AND

24 HAVING PREVIOUSLY BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED AND

25 SAID AS FOLLOWS:

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2 MR. DAVIS: Good morning. Anthony 3 Davis, A-N-T-H-O-N-Y, D-A-V-I-S I'm one of the 4 three Supervisors in Summit Township and I just - I 5 have a few points to make for the casino. Presque Isle Downs and Casino benefits the community by 6 7 generating significant tax revenue for Summit 8 Township and the neighboring townships, as well as 9 Erie County as a whole. With the revenue in Summit 10 Township helps to support our local fire department, 11 allowing them to provide the proper level of 12 emergency services to the residents and the 13 employees of Summit. 14 The casino donates, generously,

\$2,500 each year for the Annual Summit Township's
Senior Picnic, which is very nice. The casino also
stimulates economic growth with its employment
opportunities at the casino and the other local
businesses such as hotels, restaurants, convenience
stores, with the tourism that it attracts.

In conclusion, having Presque Isle

Downs and Casino and Summit Township has been

extremely beneficial, and we support the renewal of
the casino's gaming license. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you. Next,

we have, from community groups, Al Messina from the Boys and Girls Club of Erie.

AL P. MESSINA,

5 CALLED AS A WITNESS IN THE FOLLOWING PROCEEDING, AND
6 HAVING PREVIOUSLY BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED AND

7 SAID AS FOLLOWS:

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MR. MESSINA: Good morning. My name is Al Messina, M-E-S-S-I-N-A. I'm the Executive Director of the Boys and Girls Club. Prior to coming to Erie, I should say back to Erie, I grew up here, I worked in other places, mainly in New York City, Washington, D.C. and other places. And with that work, I had the opportunity that maybe I would know otherwise have had to work with CEO's of Fortune 500 companies. I worked with NASA scientists at the Hoover Institution of Stanford. I worked with senior members of the Justice Department, including the Deputy Attorney General of the United States.

The reason I referenced these examples, is to illustrate what a high level of professionalism looks like, and what a high level of integrity looks like, and the point I want to make

here is that I see these same attributes in the
leadership team with Gary Hendricks, Matt Ennis,

Jennifer Sead, Brenda Moski and Jake Rack. And I've
seen something else in them that I think has kind of
already been reported here today. And that is they
have a deep dedication to the community, and
particularly in my case, to kids.

In fact, absent their efforts, they've raised a lot of money on our behalf. But absent those efforts, I'm not sure we would have made it through the pandemic, but we did. We're doing fine now. The Club is a safe haven. It sits on the edge of perhaps the most dangerous, the most violent neighborhood in Erie County. Maybe one of the most violent in the state. But kids who come to the club, they can find mentors to mentor them. They can have their talents nurtured and they're in a safe place.

It's an iconic institution in Erie.

Established in 1895, and thousands of young people have gone through that institution and because of its influence, have I think, found a better life for themselves. I know this to be true because I'm one of them.

So as you think about renewing the

license for Presque Isle Downs and Casino, which, of
course, I support and we support, I would simply
point out the tremendous professionalism of the
people involved in it, their integrity, and most
important, perhaps to me, is their deepest

6 dedication to the kids of the Erie County community.

7 | Thank you.

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PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you. Mr.

Messina, we have a question from Board Members, I'm
sorry.

MS. REGAN: I was just wondering if you could specify how exactly the casino supports the Boys and Girls Club. Is it strictly financial?

MR. MESSINA: It is financial. They participate in our major fundraiser. They're the big dog in the group. And I don't know if I want to calculate the numbers, but it's really very significant and it's provided a lot of -. It's

allowed us to keep the lights on, open the doors, pay the staff and do the work and change the lives children. So without them, I think it would be hard and stressful to make our budget.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you. And Joseph Pfadt, from the Warriors to Washington.

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MR. PFADT: That's okay. It's Joe

10 someone. My name is spelled J-O-E, P-F-A-D-T and

11 I'm the President of Warriors to Washington. We're

Pfadt, just like you got in a fight, you fought

12 a local Nonprofit, 501(c)(3) that features C three,

13 that features a mission of taking veterans to

14 Washington, D.C. once a year. In fact, a week and-

15 a-half ago, we were in Washington on our annual

16 trip.

Just as a role for the Presque Downs

and how much we what they've done for our

19 organization, they allow us to use their parking lot

20 to park our vehicles from Friday night until we

21 return on Sunday. For veterans who have a certain

22 insecurity about the surroundings around them, by

23 having that parking lot security in place is a

24 wonderful thing for them. It helps us assure the

veterans that people are caring about them and

caring for them. And I think for our mission to support our local veterans, that's a hallmark of it. We want to show them support. We want to show them that people are aware of them and are caring about them and caring for them and that's what our group is intended to do.

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We leave on Friday. The casino has been terrific in support. They support us with our first evening meal. Again, so that's a way for us to show our veterans that people in the community care about them. We go to Washington, D.C., we see the sites, we tour the Capitol. We go to the Declaration of Independence, the Constitution, Bill of Rights, and for anybody who's ever served, and myself, I've served for 30 years, when you take your oath, you're taking it to the constitution and it's a moving and powerful experience to stand in front of the Constitution because that's the document that you wrote that blank check as a service member to.

And we go from there, we tour all the sites that we can, from the mall, from the White House down to Washington Monument, the Lincoln Memorial, to new World War II Memorial, the Vietnam Wall. We take Vietnam veterans with us, and it's a powerful and moving time for them as well. We go to

the Iwo Jima Memorial where our marines can have
their moment. And then on Sunday, the next day, we
go to the Pentagon first. We have two individuals
that speak with us, one who was in the Pentagon,
another one who had their in-laws on American 77 and
were lost in that.

So that powerful moment occurs, and again, we can't do that without sponsors and support, without people like the casino. The most significant event that we do is we go to Arlington and we conduct a reflecting ceremony and someone locally donates the wreath, and it just has that power for the organization, for those guests that we bring, for the veterans and their guests that we bring on the trip.

And again, all that is possible because we get donations from people to do this, and Presque Isle Downs Casino has really stepped up to the plate for us to offer their support financially to make this trip possible so that we can do events like the George Washington Trip to Washington, D.C.

We do four events throughout the year. We're coming up on number two. On Veterans Day we have a relationship with Presque Isle State Park and we conduct a flag raising ceremony there.

From that event, in May, on Memorial Day week, we have a reception for all the people who have gone on the trip and the people we're going to take in the next year and then we do a - in Presque Isle State park in June as well.

Again, I can't speak highly enough of the team from Presque Isle Down in how they've supported our veterans. Over the course of the last - it's been at least ten years that we've had direct support from them and our organization is about 14 years old, and we're very local. In fact, I went through fourth and fifth grade at Summit Central across the street over there.

So I'm about as local as you get.

But I appreciate their support financially and their support emotionally. One of the things that we try and strive for is a small organization is that our veterans feel appreciated and appreciated by the community. So we worked hard to do that and with their help and support, they made that much easier for us to do. Thank you.

MR. HENDRICKS: Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you. That is the end of the list that I have registered. Is there anyone here today who thought they registered

1 or would like to speak? Raise your hand.

Yes. Come on up. Good morning, and

3 you are?

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4 MS. HORTON: Good morning. My name 5 is Gary Horton. I am currently wearing several hats. Gary is G-A-R-Y, H-O-R-T-O-N. I am currently 6 7 the President of the local brand of the NAACP, of which I've been the President the last six years. 8 9 I'm the coordinator of the Eastside Grassroots 10 Coalition, a neighborhood revitalization group, of 11 which I've been coordinator the last eight years. 12 We have a project to revitalize the Buffalo Road, a 13 neighborhood that half the residents are children, 14 18 and under. A third of them are in homes headed

by single parent women. And our neighborhood has

been racked with disinvestment.

First, the bank closed, then the drug store, then the local elementary school, then the bakery. And what we have taken its place are smoke and vape shops, skilled games that were spoken of here earlier and just people who - liquor establishments, people who really don't have the best interest of the vulnerable population at heart.

I also am privileged to serve on the Governor's Advisory Board for Environmental Justice.

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I serve as the Director of the Urban Erie Community
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    Development Corporation, of which I've been the
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    Director come January, 25 years. And I'm privileged
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    to provide educational programs and language
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    programs and afterschool programs for new American
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    populations, in particular, children from resettled
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    families from places like Tanzania, the Congo,
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    Rwanda, Burundi, Sudan, Iraq, Syria, Afghanistan,
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    and I probably forgot a few, but I have over 200
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    children. Public schools and after school programs
    at four different sites, two different Muslim
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    mosques, one at the Nepali Center, and a hundred
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    students at a local elementary school.
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                   I am here to support the Application
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    for Renewal, but I believe they can do more.
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    think they can do better. Some of the goals or
    results that I heard presented here since this
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    gaming has been in Erie, it could and should.
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    my hope that it presents an opportunity to impact
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    minority populations better than they have. I
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    appreciate the outreach that they've done to
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    organizations. I believe they can do more for
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    minorities.
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                   I think it can be reflected in the
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    outreach, the results that they're trying to get in
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1 employment and participation. Erie has a large -2 almost one-quarter of Erie's population, the City of 3 Erie, is minority. I would hope that even though 4 these public hearings are held in the municipality 5 where the license is, that you can have a public hearing in the City of Erie sometime over some issue 6 7 to get input from where Erie's total minority or 8 most majority minority population lives, or new 9 American population.

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Erie's new population has been stabilized or benefited from the influx of new Americans in our community, and I didn't hear any representation or recognition of having to kind of bridge to those populations. I've been in the casino one time. Well, I'll take that back. COVID I was provided a meeting within the administration during the initial renewal or initial licensing process. I was an elected school board member. It's where I served eight years, and we were prevented by law from attending or participating in the opening and the launch of the And therefore, I never - I only came back casino. once for a surprise birthday party for someone in one of the restaurants. I have never been into the casino outside of that.

And the people that are with the casino since its beginning, they can tell you, I have helped them hire people, initially. I built job fairs and things like that I feel benefited them from the beginning. I believe they need a consultant. They need input from the City. The consultants that I've seen have been from outside our area. Maybe they're good at what they do, but it's not good enough for the impact that it does not have on the population who state their hopes and dreams by coming to the casino trying to win.

It's not reflected in the hiring or the outreach. And I just - I believe that they can do better. I'm appealing to you. Maybe they need a nudge and that everybody doesn't say everything is so good and they just keep on status quo. I want to see them do better. That's my hope. And that because I recognize the impact and opportunity that they have.

So I stand here today in support of it, but also hopeful and optimistic that they can appreciate my comments from a constructive standpoint and endeavor to do better for the minority population in our region. Thank you for coming. Provided me the opportunity to share and I

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    entertain any questions that you may have.

MR. DERMODY: Have you reached out to them?

MR. HORTON: I tried to go online and register to make comments at this hearing. I was looking for the opportunity. I've looked at their Diversity Statement, and it kind of leaves a lot to, you know, I feel like I'm in their network. They should be reaching out to me. I'm a person who has - who has proved that I have helped them in the past. I would challenge any of them to say I haven't helped them in the past, and I'm willing to do that in the future because I believe they can -.

This opportunity, this business represents an opportunity to benefit people who look like me. My last point is in the economic benefit to all the categories, I never heard any economic benefit to the minority community and I didn't hear what the impact was on any of that, and I believe that we take numbers of the people who come to the casino and that I believe that the representation of

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    minorities, even though I haven't been there, my
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    estimate is that it's up there somewhere as a
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    customer, and I just believe they can do better.

Having a voice helps.

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MS. REGAN: Thank you. And would you agree though, that their efforts at the Boys and Girls Club is something that's probably benefitting

the minority population?

MR. GORTON: I send students to the Boys and Girls Club. I work with the Boys and Girls Club, but I also know that I have a much larger, more diverse population and programs. I have 30 employees. I don't know how many Boys and Girls club has. I hired 70 kids, 14 to 18, for the summer, to teach them landscaping and other kinds of skills, so they would not walk around. Last year, until they got in trouble, last year I hired a hundred kids.

I've been able to access AARP funds for both the county and the city and for the school district to do that because I believe, as my friend Al said, our young people are important we don't nearly invest enough in them. There's a lot of retention folks. Some of the kids will go on, other kids who kind of do what we provide for them, stand around and look. I think more has to be done for those students and their very diverse and I agreed more can be done at the Boys and Girls Club, but I also believe more can be done in the populations that I serve.

MS. REGAN: Thank you.

CHAIR SMYLER: I have a -.

PRESIDING OFFICER: The Chair has a question.

CHAIR SMYLER: Well, maybe not necessarily a question. I'm glad you come forward, Mr. Horton. I can tell you that we at Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board have been trying to increase diversity, not only within our organization, but also within the industry. And my assistant tried to reach out to the NAACP in Erie, it was last year and received no response because we wanted to set up a meeting.

We, Gaming Control Board, with your organization to specifically talk about the issues that you are raising and addressing, to try to make better inroads into the community, and to also try to make better inroads into recruiting folks from the community, into the gaming industry and the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board.

So if you can provide contact information, I will personally make sure that my staff reaches out. In fact, our Administrative Director sitting in the back, and she's been a part of this meeting. We've met with organizations like yours in several cities across the Commonwealth already, and it's proven to be very fruitful.

1 So I'm just saying we did try to 2 reach out to you guys and I'm glad you're here 3 because we do want to work with you, and I'm sure 4 the casino will have their own response, but we have 5 made that effort and we're going to continue to make 6 that effort. So if you can make sure we have your 7 contact information, I will quarantee somebody will 8 be in touch with you.

6 be built.

And just one point, I think it's important to raise that Summit Township does receive two percent of the local share, but Erie County does as well, and I think people need to understand that that money is there for economic development projects in the county. It also should be used for initiatives that maybe Mr. Horton was discussing here today, but we'll be willing to make - reach out to your organization.

MR. HORTON: Yeah, I certainly appreciate that and look forward to that. I bought that abandoned elementary school, Alberton. It's the oldest public school building in City of Erie. I purchased that and the gaming people gave me \$100,000 for predevelopment towards the \$10 million that it will take to revitalize that building and put it back in place.

So I certainly recognize that, but also recognize they don't have a diversity plan or

That includes the OEC, BIE, Bureau of 4 5 Casino Compliance, Bureau of Licensing, Office of 6 Communications, and of course, Office of Hearings 7 and Appeals. We are glad to 10 hear that they share our sediments that there is a 11 positive working relationship at the property 12 between the casino, the regulator and law 13 enforcement.

Lastly, we want to thank the representatives from Summit Township, Mr. Davis, for taking time out of your busy schedule to appear in support of our Application, as well as the representatives from the nonprofit organizations, Al Messina and Joe Pfadt for appearing today.

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And lastly, I want to also acknowledge the distinguished members of the General Assembly who offered Letters of Support of this Renewal application. Senator Laughlin, and Representatives Bizzarro and Merski, who also are not here today, but offered their strong support of

this Renewal Application. So again, thank you for
