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PRESIDING OFFICER: Good afternoon, My name is Linda Lloyd and I'm the Presiding Officer assigned by the Board today to conduct this portion of the Category 4 License Renewal Hearing for Hollywood Casino Morgantown. Before we begin, if we can please turn off or vibrate - vibrate our cellphones and other electronic devices.

We don't interrupt our speakers and I would like to remind everyone that this proceeding is being recorded by a Court Reporter over here to my right, and also being recorded on video and live streamed to the internet. That recording will also be put up on the Board's website some time in the next few days. So if you want to go watch it again, feel free, and any exhibits entered today into the record will also be posted on board's website in the next few days.

So as the Presiding Officer, I call this hearing to order. The date is Wednesday, April 2nd, 2025. The time is 1:30 and location is the Caernarvon Township Building at 3307 Main Street in Morgantown, Pennsylvania.

The Race Horse Development and Gaming Act, as amended, requires that Section 1326, that an operator's license shall be subject to renewal by the Board every five years. This License Renewal Hearing is convened by the Board, pursuant to the mandate found in Section 1205(b) of the Gaming Act that requires as part of this renewal process, that a public input hearing be held in the municipality where the license facility is located.

This public hearing was advertised on the Board's website, announced by the Board Chair at Public Board Meetings and advertised in local newspapers. And the Board Members present with us today are to my immediate right, Chair Denise Smyler, Commissioner Frank Dermody and our newest Commissioner, George Dunbar. And to my left, Commissioner Fran Regan and Commissioner Nedia Ralston.

The hearing will begin with a presentation by Hollywood Casino Morgantown. And after that presentation, our Board, Office of Enforcement Counsel and the Board will have opportunity to ask questions of their witnesses. After that presentation is concluded, our OEC will make a presentation and the Board and Counsel for

Hollywood will have opportunity to ask questions of each OEC witness. After the close of testimony and evidence from both parties, those individuals who have registered to speak today during the public comment period will have their name called. And all public speakers during that time will have five minutes to provide their thoughts regarding the renewal of the license. Following the close of that public comment, each party will have the opportunity to provide a short closing statement.

So let's begin by having all the witnesses from Hollywood Casino and our OEC, if you'd stand and raise your right hand to be sworn by our Court Reporter.

So, Hollywood Casino Morgantown?

ATTORNEY KING: Thank you. Good afternoon, Presiding Officer Lloyd, Chair Smyler and all the Commissioners. I'm Adrian King,

A-D-R-I-A-N, King, K-I-N-G, from the Ballard Spahr
Law Firm. I'm here on behalf of the Applicant for the Renewal of its license, which is Hollywood

Casino Morgantown. And also here on behalf of its parent entity, Penn Entertainment, which is, as you know, headquartered in Wyomissing.

We have the whole Hollywood Casino

Morgantown team here and we'll get right to our

presentation without a lot of delay. But let me

just introduce the team. I am, with the Presiding

Officer's permission -. We're having a problem with

the slides. Where should we put - best place to -?

With the Presiding Officer's permission, I will not spell the names only because we've already given the Court Reporter a written list that he can refer to.

So with me, immediately to my right is Michele Collins. Michele is the Vice President and General Manager of the property, and to her

right is Alex Hvizda, who's the Regional Director of Compliance, and then behind me and I'll ask him to stand, is Greg Stechyshyn. I think I got that right.

MR. STECHYSHYN: You did.

ATTORNEY KING: Who's the Director of Operations. Jason Markle, who's the Director of Marketing and Jason Johnson, who's the Director of Human Resources. And with that, I'm going to turn it over to Michele for the presentation.

MS. COLLINS: Thank you. Good afternoon commissioners. I'm Michele Collins, M-I-C-H-E-L-E, C-O-L-L-I-N-S, and I am the General Manager at Hollywood Morgantown. I do have the majority of my team with me today and one thing I would like to note is Penn Entertainment is really great about promoting within and really helping with talent development, and 9 out of the 13 of us here today have grown within the company at Penn Entertainment. So, it's very exciting to see and as you know, it's an entirely new team just about. So, we are ready to work over the next five years and make Hollywood Morgantown great.

of 2017, the Gaming Expansion Act enacted and

As we look at the history, in October

created Category 4 casinos. In April of 2018, the Morgantown license was won with a bid of \$7.5 million, and in June of 2019, the first awarded category license would get granted in Pennsylvania. The regulated expansion allowed Penn Entertainment to utilize a plot of land that was previously developed for the Tri-County Mall, a commercial shopping center. This project did not come to fruition due to the 2008 recession.

As previously mentioned, once the license was awarded in June of 2019, Penn began construction. However, this came to a halt due to COVID-19 and the pandemic. Staying committed to our promises as soon as the restrictions were lifted, we continued to work diligently to get the Property opened by December 22nd of 2021. This allowed us to turn this unused plot of land into an economic generator for the surrounding area.

The total investment for Hollywood

Casino Morgantown was \$113 million. \$65 million was

spent with local business enterprises. \$1.5 million

was with minority women-owned businesses. The

project created 275 construction jobs and also

created over 300 jobs to run the property, which

Jason Johnson will speak to later.

As we review the numbers, since we opened, the property has generated over \$200 million in gross gaming revenue, which equates to over 105 million in gaming and racing taxes and fees paid since opening. Our success supports the success of Caernarvon Township, which has received approximately \$1.3 million per year in local share funds.

Local business enterprise spend increased from \$508,000 in 2022 to \$1.65 million in 2024. Minority women-business enterprise spend increased from \$564,000 in 2022, to nearly \$1 million in 2024. We work with 17 different minority and women business enterprises.

We are a sponsor of the following organizations. At Penn, we have a diversity incubator which allows us to procure and work to try and develop diverse vendors in categories where there are few or none. This includes Women's Business Enterprise National Council, National Minority Supplier Diversity Counsel, U.S. Pacific Islander and Asian Chamber, U.S. Black Chamber, National Gay Lesbian Chamber, U.S. Hispanic Chamber, and the National Veteran-Owned Business Administration.

And now I will turn it over to operations. Thank you.

MR. STECHYSHYN: Good morning Commissioners.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Good morning.

MR. STECHYSHYN: My name is Greg Stechyshyn, S-T-E-C-H-Y-S-H-Y-N. I'm the Director of Operations. Thank you for giving me the opportunity to speak here today. I'd like to talk a little bit about our slot operations, table operations and sportsbook.

Slots, when we first opened way back in the beginning, we were very eager to have the property be a success right from the beginning. So much so that were able to stage the whole property up in York and then transport it down to Morgantown within a three-week period prior to opening, which was quite an accomplishment for our teams. When we first started, we had 750 games. Currently, we're down to 675, but that seems to be the right number. We're seeing a steady increase in revenue because we listen to what the guests are telling us and what they want. So our plan is not to reduce that anymore at the current time.

When we first opened, we had a lot of

games on our smoking porches. Smoking porches and the square footage inside accounted for about 40 percent. What we found is that a lot of the guests did not want to play out on the smoking porch. They were underperforming out there. So we brought them inside because again, we listened to the guests. Right now we're down to mid-50s in the games out on our deck and our intent is to bring those inside as well and better utilize that space for other entertainment purposes.

We opened a high-limit area in 2023 and just completed another expansion to make it one of the biggest in the state. We're always upgrading and trying to bring the latest and greatest slot product to our guests. This year, we're going to spend over \$2.2 million annually in capital spend and lease fees, again, to bring the latest product to the floor. The big message is that we want to try and have a game for every type of player, whether that's someone who's coming in looking for entertainment or someone who - some of our high rollers who are looking for a little more volatility in the games.

When we look at table games; currently, we have 23 tables and two pits, five

poker tables and one set of five electronic table games.

We added poker in 2024 and actually just recently in the last couple weeks we moved it to a new area that's really resonating with those players and helping to grow the revenue there. We added two multi-property linked progressives that's linked with all of our other properties in Pennsylvania. One of them is on blackjack and the other one is on what we call our novelty games, the games that you have to have five cards to make certain hands.

One of the reasons we wanted to do this is because we wanted to provide an opportunity for any guest to have a life-changing win for just a \$5 investment. And actually on the blackjack, we've had the two biggest ones in our linked progressive hit at the Morgantown property. So, for \$5, one guest walked away with over \$380,000. And some of our other properties, those jackpots get even bigger. At the Meadows, we had one guest walk away with \$837,000 for just a \$5 investment.

And then sportsbook, we recently converted the branding to ESPN Bet and I would like to turn it over to Jason. Thank you for your time.

MR. MARKLE: Hello, everyone, my name is Jason Markle, and I am the Director of Marketing at Hollywood Casino Morgantown and I'm going to take us through the next couple slides, which are focused on our non-gaming aspects. So, first let me share our food and beverage options. We have three different options for our guests to enjoy. Tony Luke's for a delicious cheesesteak, Red Lotus Kitchen for some fantastic Asian dishes and one we're most recently excited about is the rebranded ESPN BET Restaurant, as Greg just mentioned.

It is currently open and it features an all-new menu with outstanding sportsbook bites. I personally recommend the French Dip sandwich if anyone's interested. But the reason we're really excited about this rebrand, in just a couple short months, as you can see from the presentation, we will be launching this to an all-ages restaurant.

So, immediately upon entering the north entrance, guests will take an immediate left and they'll have direct access to the restaurant without ever having to access the gaming floor.

We'll obviously keep our security in place to ensure that there are no minors that cross that, but we're really excited about being able to launch this

because what it'll do is it'll allow us to activate the space in ways we haven't done in the past.

We also will feature a game room within ESPN BET. So, it'll have classic games such as ski-ball and air hockey. It'll really just give a great room for the entire family to enjoy as they're watching, you know, their favorite teams. We've seen great success with the overall or the all-ages concept with our sister property down in Perryville and we look to emulate that as well. And lastly, by design we have our enormous Bar 76, which is our main casino bar and a great segue to the next slide.

So, Bar 76 is the surrounding area where we host all of our live entertainment currently, but more importantly, we host free live entertainment every Friday and Saturday night for all of our guests to enjoy. We bring in regional DJs and bands starting at 8:00 p.m. every weekend, and it's absolutely no cost to the guests.

Aside from entertainment, we also have great partnerships both locally and regionally. I'm going to highlight our partnership with the Phillies. We're going into our second straight year with this partnership and as you can see in the

presentation, were able to get Phillies alum Ryan Howard on property last year for a meet and greet and for guests to win signed memorabilia.

We'll duplicate this effort this year with another well-known alum, which I'm going to remain unnamed at the time, but that will happen in the summer. Not only do we have fantastic partnerships that benefit our local guests, but they also benefit other partners we work with. Working with the Phillies Charities, Inc., we will have Philly-themed food and beverage specials where a portion of the proceeds will be donated to the I'm Able Foundation.

By leveraging our non-gaming aspects and partnerships, we've already created, as well as what will continue to create in the future, our goal is for Morgantown to be viewed more so as a destination rather than just a pass-through city. To that point, Alex and I are actually working on getting attraction signage along the highway, which will support several local businesses and really drive home reasons for people to visit the area as a destination.

Again, thank you for your time. I'm going to pass it to Jason to talk about human

resources.

MR. JOHNSON: Good afternoon,

Commissioners. I am Jason Johnson, J-A-S-O-N,

J-O-H-N-S-O-N, I am the Director of Human Resources

at Morgantown Casino and I will first start talking

about reflecting our community.

So, in 2019, we had started with the vision with the license of employing 250 team members. We are now currently at 326. So, we've exceeded that promise and we're currently 82 percent come from the Tri-County area, Berks, Lancaster and Chester and with about 180 team members from the Berks County alone.

Of our employees, we have 42 percent female, 29.6 percent racial minority, which is more diverse than the Berks County, Chester County and Lancaster County. Of our exempt employees, we have 31 percent female and 25 and-a-half percent racial minority. And then because great people know great people, we also offer a referral bonus of \$200 per team members to bring other team members in with us.

So, growing together from '21 to '24, we've had 68 team members promote from an hourly position to a salary leader role within the company, and a lot of it's been achieved through our

workforce development program, some of which you see listed on the slide. And we have 13 talent development programs currently and we keep growing that number. In 2022, we only had five. The ones I'd like to highlight would be the Emerging Leaders program, which is a 13-week leadership course that allows our hourly team members to transition and find that knack for leadership and transition into those leadership roles.

So, when looking at this slide, the first thing you'll notice is our turnover numbers. I would just say that 2021 is a little skewed on the chart above because were only open a few days that year, December 22nd to December 30th, so all terminations were under 90 days. That's why that number looks so high, but then as you see in '22 to '24, the numbers normalize and they've been pretty steady since.

When it comes to staffing, we only have a couple positions that have been challenging to hire, which is our cooks and our facilities team members. Other than that, we haven't really seen any staffing challenges at this time. One of the reasons why we get to - we have such a decent retention rate is because day one, everybody is

eligible for their benefits.

So, part-time team members, they are eligible for PTO. They have Employee Assistance Program assistance, which is counseling. There is Penn Perks, they are eligible for 401K, which is 50 percent of their first six percent and tuition reimbursement as well. Part-time team members enjoy \$2,000 for undergraduate and \$3,000 for graduate studies. And then, of course, again, the referral bonus is open for part-time team members as well.

When it comes to full time, they get full medical, dental, vision coverage if they want to opt into it, along with a little bit higher tuition reimbursement. There's also other voluntary benefits through that. And we also - another benefit is we also offer flexible scheduling. So, some of our biggest department casino OPs with Greg, he has shifts where there's ten-hour shifts, that they can -. So, it's a three-day weekend that, you know, they can have that work/life balance.

Also paid training. We also offer training to our dealers that want to come in that may never have any experience. They'll get paid \$13 an hour, which is well above minimum wage to learn a new skill.

And then we also have for our current team members, assistance with their children. We have a diversity scholarship fund that annually awards \$1,500 for vocational programs, \$2,500 for a two-year program, \$5,000 to \$10,000 a year for a four-year programs and then there's also a new business and finance that's also a \$10,000 a year.

So, we also not only look out for our team members, but we want, you know, generations to grow too. And that is all I got. Thank you for your time.

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: Good afternoon,

Madam Chair, Members of the Commission, Presiding

Officer Lloyd. I'm Alex Hvizda. I'm the Regional

Director of Compliance, H-V-I-Z-D-A, and I'm here to

talk about our surrounding community here.

So, I am a Berks County born and raised right up the road in Sinking Spring. Played many soccer games at Twin Valley throughout my youth, and it's great to be able to be a part of something that is benefiting the Township and the area this much.

So, what we have up on the slide there is both our direct giving and the local share funds. So, one of the benefits of regulated gaming

and having a Category 4 casino right here in Berks County is that there are local share funds that are generated from our slots, and our tables and our sports-wagering activity. And those funds are available to different municipalities and organizations through the Department of Community and Economic Development program.

And you can see now they basically run about a year behind, and we were only open for nine days of 2021. But in 2023, from the Cat 4 bucket, there was \$715,868 spent here in Berks County, and in 2024, that increased to \$1.255 million, and hopefully it will keep going up as more people become aware of this and the funds keep coming in from the casino.

Those grants that are directly from the local share generated by Hollywood Casino

Morgantown went to 22 different entities for things like vehicles and equipment for first responders, public works improvement, building security upgrades and pedestrian safety upgrades.

Then there's also a statewide pot that is funded by things like legal VGTs, and Berks County entities received \$4.1 million in grants from those in 2023, and \$12.7 million in grants from that

pot in 2024, which went to 45 different entities for infrastructure, public park and theater restorations and safety enhancements.

So, that's one of the benefits of regulated gaming and it's another recruiting tool that we are able to use with our team members, because we are a locals casino, and our team members live in the same communities in which our customers come from. And we are able to recruit team members by showing that what they're doing here at the property is benefiting things in their own backyard and their own communities.

We also do direct giving, which is the green bars there. So, our direct giving is a combination of different things. It could be company money, it could be the leftover Tito's. So, if somebody gets a ticket from a slot machine, say it's, you know, \$30.23 when they go to redeem it at the ticket reduction unit, it gives them the opportunity to donate that money to one of four charities that leftover change there.

And we also do an employee payroll contributions program in which our team members can choose to donate either \$5 or \$10 from their paycheck per pay period, with half of that going to

whoever our selected charity is, and the other half going to our team Member Emergency Assistance Fund.

The Team Member Emergency Assistance
Fund is something that we have that is solely to
support team members who have some sort of emergency
situation that's not covered by insurance or
anything else. So, for example, we got a team
member at PNRC who needed to get her mother out of
Ukraine when war broke out there two years ago, and
were able to use that money to get a plane ticket to
get her safely over here to her daughter.

We also don't just ask our team members to give us money for the payroll contributions. We reward them as well with AwardCo Points, which is an employee rewards program where they can use those on Amazon in order to purchase things and other things. They get two free tickets to Hershey Park, tickets to our Summer Concerts Series of PNRC, and then other discounts and stuff throughout the year.

So, on the right, there are some of the partnerships we've had, and some of them are here to speak to you today. Others have submitted letters of support, but we don't just want to use our pocketbooks to support them. We like to get out

with our hands and our feet in the community. So, we've volunteered at the Honeybrook Food Pantry, the Veteran Affairs National Day of Service, the Children's home of Reading, the Helping Harvest food Bank, Easter Seals and Relay for Life. And we're always cooking up new programs for people to be able to volunteer with their hands and their feet.

So, you heard Michele talk about the benefits that have been coming to Caernarvon

Township in the form of the local share funds that they getting over \$1.2 million per year now. You heard Jason talk about we originally thought it was only going to be 250 permanent jobs here. We're at 326, and we still have more positions we're trying to fill. You just saw what I presented about the local share funds going to the community around here and all of this is great, but it's also at risk because of skill games.

So, just like we did when we did our renewal for Hollywood Casino Penn National Race Course in Grantville, we did a survey looking at a ten-mile radius around this property here. Now, you can see there's a lot of beautiful farmland around here, but even within the ten-mile radius around us, we found over 168 skill gains at over 35-plus

locations.

If you were coming here today, at the corner of where Main Street - or excuse me, where Morgantown Road goes into Main Street, there's a bar right there that has the play skill games sign right on it. And that middle bottom picture there is, about a mile down the road here, a smoke shop that's literally just advertising it as slots. They're not even trying to say that it's skill games right in their window there. So, the thing that we're trying to get across is, up at the top there I have three pictures. One of those is a skill game, one of those is a slot and one of those is a VGT.

I would submit to you that to the average consumer out there, they don't know the difference between the three of them. They all look very similar and play similar. The key here is that two of those things, the slot and the VGT are taxed at over 50 percent; have a local share assessment that's benefiting the surrounding communities; are connected to the central control computer system, so the Department of Revenue knows down to the second, down to the penny, exactly how much revenue they should be collecting; have surveillance cameras for safety in there; have extensive cash-handling

controls and most importantly coming from the compliance guy is responsible gaming controls.

So, at Hollywood Casino, Morgantown and all of our land-based properties, every single employee, regardless of your position, whether you work on the gaming floor, you work in the back of the house, whatever goes through Responsible Gaming training, which is administered by the Council on Compulsive Gambling of Pennsylvania.

They do that upon hire and then they do annual refresher every year. We also have a robust program where every quarter we randomly select employees and give them a pop quiz on our responsible gaming controls to make sure that they are aware of it. On the back of house side, we are looking at play patterns to see if we can find anything like a sudden sustained increase in play that could be suggestive of somebody that we need to have a conversation with or take a look at more closely.

We have the gaming agents right onsite that they can go and talk to and learn about the different self-exclusion programs. And then everywhere where you can get money out, we have the stickers that have the QR codes that take you

directly to Responsible play.pa.gov so they can get in touch with those resources.

employees is we, again, explain to them what the vested interest is in there. Again, as a locals casino, we live in the same communities that our players come from. And we know that any type of addiction, drugs, sex, alcohol, gaming, whatever, doesn't just affect the addict or the addict's immediate family, but instead has a ripple effect throughout the community.

So that's one thing we always stress with our team members is forget the fact that you could lose your job if you don't do it. This is to protect you and our surrounding community. Same thing with Responsible Alcohol Service where we always stress with all of our team members, and we train anybody who serves alcohol, anybody who's doing sobriety assessment, anybody who's issuing credit, gets trained and responsible alcohol service.

We explained to them again, vested interest. If that person gets behind the wheel that shouldn't be getting behind the wheel. The first thing they have to do is get off the property. And

the people that are coming and going from the property more often than anybody else is us. So, we are one of the major risks, which is why we want to focus on responsible alcohol service.

I can tell you from our VGT partners, they also have to have at least one employee who is licensed at all times on site. That employee also goes through the Board's required Responsible Gaming program and that, they have a VGT self-exclusion list they get to identify those individuals.

Everything I just said, none of it's happening with skill games. And what's particularly interesting about this area is that through our research here, our survey, we found two full-blown skilled games partner parlors, one in New Holland, about 12 miles from here that had 24 games in it. One on the east side of Lancaster that had 12 games in it, and one in Ephrata that's about to open.

And if you recall, it was either 19 or 20 where every municipality or almost every municipality in Lancaster County was given the opportunity to opt out of legal, regulated, taxed VGTs. And just in our little slice of the county that we looked at, there were over 62 VGTs just there. So, instead of having - excuse me, skill

games. So, instead of having taxed and regulated gaming, they now have untaxed and unregulated gaming on every corner.

So, I say this just because this continues to be a threat to the taxed and regulated gaming business and all the benefits it's bringing to the local communities. And with that we'll do, closing remarks and questions?

ATTORNEY KING: Well, our presentation is concluded. I don't know, Presiding Officer Lloyd, whether we'll do questions now or move over to the OEC part?

PRESIDING OFFICER: Let's do housekeeping and enter your exhibits so we don't forget.

1 PRESIDING OFFICER: Does OEC have any 2 objection? 3 ATTORNEY BIZUB: No objection. 4 PRESIDING OFFICER: Those are entered 5 into the record and will be provided to all the 6 Board Members in the future and on the Board's 7 website. 8 9 (Whereupon, Hollywood Casino Morgantown Exhibit 10 1, Presentation, was admitted.) 11 (Whereupon, Hollywood Morgantown Exhibit 2, 12 Letter of Support, was admitted.) (Whereupon, Hollywood Casino Morgantown Exhibit 13 14 3, United Way Letter of Support, was admitted.) 15 (Whereupon, Hollywood Casino Morgantown Exhibit 16 4, Honey Brook Food Pantry Letter of Support, 17 was admitted.) 18 19 ATTORNEY KING: Very good. Thank 20 you. 21 PRESIDING OFFICER: So, we will now 22 move to OEC, if you have questions for any of the 23 witnesses? Seems to be a me problem here with my 24 microphone. 25 ATTORNEY BIZUB: Thank you, Director

Lloyd. Good afternoon, Members of the Board.

Shelby Bizub, B-I-Z-U-B, Assistant Enforcement

Counsel with the OEC. And I just have a few

questions for Hollywood Casino.

Alex, you talked about the random training. How many team members in total are selected for that?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: Yep. So, each quarter we select ten team members, five of whom have gone through RAMP training. And then once those team members are selected, they can't be selected again for another year.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: Thank you. And to slide nine, slots, are there currently any plans to reduce the slot machine or table games count?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: No.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: And is the percentage of the area of the gaming floor that permits smoking planning to change?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: No.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: Can you please tell me what steps are being taken to enhance workforce diversity and inclusion for supervisors and above?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: Yep. So, that would be what Jason was talking about on the growing

together. So, several years ago we only had about five different workforce development programs. Now it's up over 20.

The big one, the two big ones I would say are the Penn Women program to help -specific -.

I mean, anybody can participate in it, but specifically designed to help women advance into leadership positions in the gaming industry because it does lack as compared to other industries, partially due to the fact that it's an evenings or weekends business. And then the other one is the Emerging Leaders program, which is to get people from the frontline hourly positions into salaried positions so that we can really tout a career in gaming, as opposed to a job in gaming.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: And I'm just going to stay on this slide. Can you tell me how many team members - or can you -? Sorry. How long must team members work before being eligible for benefits?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: Day one.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: And are part-time

workers eligible for PTO?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: They are.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: And how many

promotions are internal?

MR. JOHNSON: I don't have an exact number for internal, but every position that we do open, we do open internally and externally and we always want to promote from within.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: And when conducting a salary analysis, are team member salaries ever cut?

MR. JOHNSON: No. Cut? No.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: And can you tell me what departments receive unattended minor training?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: It's part of the responsible -. Yeah, the responsible gaming training that everybody, regardless of your position, gets that training annually and then a refresher every year. And then our security and surveillance departments do what we call Tier Two Responsible Gaming training, which is further in depth detail about how to respond to certain incidents like unattended minors.

 $\underline{\text{ATTORNEY BIZUB:}} \quad \text{Thank you.} \quad \text{I have}$ no further questions.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Mr. King, do you have any follow-up questions for your witnesses for that?

ATTORNEY KING: I do not. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay.

I will return to Board Members and
I'll start to my left with Commissioner Ralston. Do
you have any questions?

MS. RALSTON: Yes, can you hear me?

ATTORNEY KING: Yes.

MS. RALSTON: So, just two questions. I believe it was Greg who mentioned the 2.2 future capital spend.

MR. STECHYSHYN: Yes.

MS. RALSTON: Could you just speak to some of the items that you're looking to do during - with that money?

MR. STECHYSHYN: So, when I refer to that, it equated to, I think, \$469,000-ish (sic) in actual slot purchases where we own the product and the rest is basically where we rent the games and assign packages from various vendors. Those are your most popular games that you see on the floor. And the ones with the really impressive sign packages that our guests really desire to play.

MS. RALSTON: Gotcha. So, it's no, like, internal structural -?

MR. STECHYSHYN: There's other spend

in that, but that wasn't encompassed as part of the \$2,200,000.

MS. RALSTON: Okay.

MS. COLLINS: This is the first year that Morgantown has received its own capital. In the past, it was based on the region. So, we received a million dollars in capital that we can use just to enhance the customer journey, as well as the employee experience. In addition to that, the ESPN BET that we were speaking of, we just did spend half-a-million dollars on that facility to make it better.

MS. RALSTON: Okay.

And then you spoke about the free live entertainment that you do on Fridays. Have you seen that that's helped to increase play and revenue during that time?

MS. COLLINS: It has helped more from a F&B, or food and beverage revenue perspective. It really doesn't correlate to additional gaming, which was part of the goal. We were really trying to offer something to the non-gamer. And what we found is we tested a DJ recently and that didn't work.

So, they really do enjoy the live entertainment, which we're going back to.

MS. RALSTON: Okay.

And then I said three, but then this is the most important question. Who's the unnamed guest that's coming?

MR. MARKLE: I'll give you his nickname. It's the Flying Hawaiian.

MS. RALSTON: Okay.

MR. MARKLE: So, if anyone's a

Phillies fan, I'm sure you know who it is.

MS. RALSTON: That's all for me.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Commissioner

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MS. REGAN: Yes. Just one question.

16 You mentioned that you don't have any plans to

17 change the smoking policy, and it sounds like your

18 customer base for the most part isn't pushing for

19 change, but I'm wondering about the employees. Do

20 you get many complaints from your employees? And if

21 not, is there - are there avenues for them to

22 express concerns about working in that kind of

23 employment environment?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: Yes. So, we do

25 engagement surveys every year and a pulse survey,

which is sort of like a pre engagement survey, and as part. And we, the leaders, get graded on those engagement surveys as to whether we are being responsive.

So our main table pit is non-smoking. So, it's usually the table games dealers that you would hear that from, but keep in mind that that - I think we said it was 34 percent of square footage and 40.9 percent of slots. About half that square footage is the gaming porch and about a quarter of those slots are out on the gaming porch. So, that has really kept down any complaints or concerns at Morgantown.

ATTORNEY KING: Can I, just for clarification, Alex, the smoking porch is unique to this property. It was kind of put there as an extra experiment, but it's actually literally an open area. It's closest to the highway.

MS. REGAN: Did I hear you say though that the smoking patios, porches weren't working and that you had to bring some of the machines back in?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: So, we had high hopes that it was going to be the wave of the future because we had seen it with success at our Ohio and our Maryland properties. However, it just didn't

take off here the way that we were anticipating.

But the story out of that is that we pivoted and we moved some of those machines inside, some into smoking, some into non-smoking area and the wind per unit on those machines increased.

So, one of the things we stress when we come before the Board is that it's not the number of slot machines that are correlated to your revenue, it's the time on device. And when those machines were out on the gaming porch, they weren't getting a lot of time on device and not generating the revenue for the Commonwealth.

By bringing them back in, and even having fewer, people are more comfortable. They're staying on those machines longer. And that's why our revenues continue to increase even though we have fewer overall slot machines.

MS. REGAN: Why is that? They just don't feel like they're part of the casino floor to be out there or -?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: I wish I could have the answer to that because, you know, we thought it was the way that things are going in the future. I know Parx has had success with it, but we follow what the customer demand is so that we can

1 make sure we're meeting their expectations. 2 MS. REGAN: Okay. 3 And just to clarify, you are 4 absolutely not getting any complaints from the 5 employees or -? 6 ATTORNEY HVIZDA: If they want a 7 complaint, they can do so through -. 8 MS. REGAN: Have they? I don't, off 9 the top of my head, know, but I can look to see how 10 many we had through the surveys. 11 MS. REGAN: Thank you. 12 PRESIDING OFFICER: Commissioner 13 Dunbar, do you have any questions? No. 14 Commissioner Dermody? 15 MR. DERMODY: Just one. You 16 mentioned that you provide healthcare for your full time and part-time employees. Do they have to 17 18 contribute? Do they contribute? 19 ATTORNEY HVIZDA: Yes. 20 MR. DERMODY: What do they have to -21 what do they contribute? 22 MR. STECHYSHYN: So the benefits 23 packages are like a marketplace. So, they choose

what type of healthcare plan, dental plan and

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MR. DERMODY: So, what percentage of their salary, for instance, whether their wages would be - would cost them for healthcare?

MR. JOHNSON: Well, that would depend on, like, what program they choose shows and we could give you some numbers back.

questions. First of all, I applaud you. I think
Michele ticked off the number of organizations that
you use and work with as far as trying to recruit
diverse candidates, and I think that's great, but I

18 think Jason said 80 percent of your workforce comes

19 from the Tri-County area?

20 <u>ATTORNEY HVIZDA:</u> Yes.

CHAIR SMYLER: What are you doing to try to recruit people from outside of the Tri-County area? Because you're not really far from Philadelphia and other areas where you might be able

25 to recruit more minorities?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: Yes. So, we did try to - excuse me. We did try that when we first opened to get people to come up from Philadelphia and some did, but as you know, there's many other casinos within the Philadelphia area which they can do. But we do attend all of those job fairs that are down there. Our postings are listed as online postings. Not just Morgantown, Pennsylvania, but southeast Pennsylvania.

And in terms of -. So, being from here, I know there's a large Latino community in Reading and to tap into that, really the best thing is our employee referral bonus. So, we have, let's see, 12.4 percent of our employees are Hispanic Latino, many of them coming from the central Berks County area, and they have been our best resource for recruiting additional Hispanic and Latino team members and then receiving that referral bonus for them.

CHAIR SMYLER: Have you reached out
to any of the HBCUs?

 $\label{eq:attorney} \underline{\text{ATTORNEY HVIZDA:}} \quad \text{Penn, as an entity,}$ works with the HBCUs. Yes.

CHAIR SMYLER: Okay.

That's good. And I'm not familiar

with table games, but the statewide-linked Hollywood Table Game Progressive, it shows two different kinds of games. Are there any other kinds of table games that you plan to bring into this statewide network?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: So the Blazing 7's is always on Blackjack, and the Five Card depends what games we offer. So, it's usually three card Poker, four card Poker, Ultimate Texas Hold'em. Some properties it'll be Mississippi Stud, some will be DJ Wild Stud Poker. And I'm missing - Let it Ride.

So, it just depends, which mix they have at it, but the whole point of this, and this is unique to Hollywood as we were the first ones to launch this with Cygames is we have four properties spread across the street - across the state. How do we make one, plus one, plus one, equal five? And it's through this program here because by having it all linked together, it means that the jackpots go up very quickly and if they do hit, there's a reserve that starts pretty high and gets back up very quickly.

And again, to Greg's point, it's a value proposition of why you should come play land-based table games and play them specifically with

us. You could do that \$5 side wager and make, you know, \$358 or \$837,000 with a \$5 investment. You can't do that with lottery or very few other things.

CHAIR SMYLER: No, it's great. I just didn't - I don't think I was aware of it before. So, that's excellent. And while Commissioner Ralston asked about the unknown player, are you recruiting any current players to come work with the casino, as opposed to retired players?

ATTORNEY HVIZDA: It's a World Series champion. People will be very happy with him.

CHAIR SMYLER: All right. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: And Mr. King, any

follow up questions based on those?

ATTORNEY KING: No, no follow-up questions. And I think absent making some closing remarks at the appropriate time, I think we are complete with respect to our evidence that we wish to put into the record.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay.

And in response to any of the questions you were going to get back to the board

with answers to, -

ATTORNEY KING: Yes.

PRESIDING OFFICER: - Mr. King, if you just want to forward those to the Board Clerk, address, email address, we'll make sure they get into the record for the Board.

ATTORNEY KING: Yeah, I've kept careful notes. We're going to get back on employee smoking complaints and also some information with respect to co pays on the health plan.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay.

ATTORNEY KING: If there's anything else I left out, please let me know.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: Prior to this
hearing, the OEC provided the Board and Hollywood
Casino Morgantown with documents marked as OEC
Exhibit 1 through 8, which relate to Hollywood
Casino's Renewal Application for its Category 4 Slot
Machine License. OEC and Hollywood Casino entered
into stipulations regarding the admissibility and
authenticity of these exhibits.

This includes the Pennsylvania State

Police's report with data obtained from the National Incident Based Reporting System from 2022 to 2024.

It addresses criminal incidents that occurred at Hollywood Casino during this period. This Report is marked as OEC Exhibit 1.

(Whereupon, OEC Exhibit 1, PSP Report, was marked for identification.)

ATTORNEY BIZUB: On March 7, 2025, the Bureau of Liquor Control Enforcement issued a Letter to OEC regarding one enforcement action taken against the Licensee since its last renewal. This Letter is marked as OEC Exhibit 2.

(Whereupon, OEC Exhibit 2, 3/7/25 Letter, was marked for identification.)

ATTORNEY BIZUB: On March 11, 2025, the Board's Office of Compulsive and Problem

Gambling issued a Memo regarding Hollywood Casino's compliance with its casino iGaming and problem gambling plans. The Memo is marked as OEC Exhibit 3.

(Whereupon, OEC Exhibit 3, 3/11/25 Memo, was 1 2 marked for identification.) 3 ATTORNEY BIZUB: On March 7, 2025, the 4 5 Pennsylvania Department of Revenue, Bureau of Compliance, provided a copy of Hollywood Casino's 6 7 Statement of Account confirming Hollywood Casino is in good standing with the Department of Revenue. 9 This is marked as OEC Exhibit 4. 10 (Whereupon, OEC Exhibit 4, 3/7/25 Statement of 11 12 Account, was marked for identification.) 13 ATTORNEY BIZUB: OEC Exhibits 5, 6 14 15 and 7 are not before you today, but remain accessible through a shared link previously provided 16 17 to Hollywood Casino and Members of the Board. the last license renewal, OEC and the License 18 19 entered into one Board Approved Consent Agreement. 20 This is marked as OEC Exhibit 5. 21 22 (Whereupon, OEC Exhibit 5, Board Approved 23 Consent Agreement, was marked for 24 identification.) 25

1 ATTORNEY BIZUB: OEC and the Licensee 2 conducted one Compliance Conference Memorandum since 3 the last renewal. This is marked as OEC Exhibit 6. 4 5 (Whereupon, OEC Exhibit 6, Compliance Conference Memo, was marked for identification.) 6 8 ATTORNEY BIZUB: OEC has issued ten 9 Warning Letters. In each instance where answer was 10 required, the Licensee responded to OEC's Letters, 11 detailing the corrective measures taken to address 12 OEC's concerns. These are jointly marked as OEC 13 Exhibit 7. 14 15 (Whereupon, OEC Exhibit 7, Warning Letters, was marked for identification.) 16 17 18 ATTORNEY BIZUB: Finally, OEC and 19 Hollywood Casino Stipulation of Facts and 20 Admissibility of Evidence executed by the parties on 21 March 27, 2025 was included and marked as OEC Exhibit 8. 22 23 (Whereupon, OEC Exhibit 8, Stipulation, was 24 25 marked for identification.)

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ATTORNEY BIZUB: At this time, OEC respectfully requests that Exhibits 1 through 8 be entered into the record, with Exhibits 4, 6 and 7 marked as confidential.

OEC will call three witnesses today to testify about Hollywood Casino for your benefit.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Hang on there.

The witnesses are from the 14 Pennsylvania State Police, the Board's Bureau of 15 Casino Compliance, and the Board's Bureau of 16 Investigation and Enforcement. With your 17 permission, Director Lloyd, I will call my first 18 witness. 19 PRESIDING OFFICER: Go ahead. 20 ATTORNEY BIZUB: OEC calls Lieutenant 21 Lacey Roane from the Pennsylvania State Police. 22 23 LIEUTENANT LACY ROANE, 24 CALLED AS A WITNESS IN THE FOLLOWING PROCEEDING, AND 25 HAVING PREVIOUSLY BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED AND

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1 SAID AS FOLLOWS:

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DIRECT EXAMINATION

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BY ATTORNEY BIZUB:

- Q. Can you please state and spell your name for the record?
- A. Lieutenant Lacy Roane, L-A-C-Y, Roane, R-O-A-N-E.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Could you use both microphones? You can use one and he can use one.

13 BY ATTORNEY BIZUB:

- Q. Please state your employer and job title.
- A. The Pennsylvania State Police. And my job title is the Eastern Section Commander of the Bureau of Gaming Enforcement.
- Q. Can you describe your career with the Pennsylvania State Police?
 - A. Sure. I enlisted on the State Police in 2011. I transferred to the Bureau of Gaming Enforcement at at the time, it was SugarHouse Casino in 2017. I was promoted to Corporal in 2017 as well. Then I was promoted to Sergeant in 2019.

I transferred back to the Bureau of

Gaming Enforcement as an office commander at Rivers

Casino in 2020 and then I was promoted to Lieutenant

and assigned to Eastern Section Commander in 2024.

Q. And what are your job duties?

- A. I oversee the overall operations of five casinos; Harrah's Chester, Rivers Philadelphia,
 Philadelphia Live, Valley Forge and Parx Bensalem.
- Q. And what is the role of the Pennsylvania State Police's Bureau of Gaming Enforcement at Hollywood Casino, Morgantown?
- A. BGE (sic) oversees the stats collection and communication with Morgantown. However, incidents that occur within the gaming facility are investigated by members assigned to the Troop L Reading Station.
- Q. And can you describe PSP's jurisdiction at Hollywood Casino? Do they share jurisdiction with anyone?
- A. The State Police maintain jurisdiction on the gaming floor and the parking lot is assigned to Caernarvon Police Department.
- Q. And does this split jurisdiction cause any issues in responding to situations inside and outside of the casino?
- A. No, not that I'm aware of.

- Q. And do you have any issues or concerns regarding the breakdown of jurisdictional areas with Caernarvon Township Police Department?
 - A. No, I do not.

- Q. And can you tell me what the professional relationship between PSP and Caernarvon Township looks like?
- A. From my understanding, it's a positive relationship. The Reading Station Commander, he speaks positively regarding their communication, their support and their relationship.
- Q. And can you describe the relationship with PSP and Hollywood Casinos employees?
- A. The State Police maintains a positive working relationship with Morgantown.
- Q. Can you describe the working relationship between PSP and the Board's Bureau of Casino Compliance?
- A. Because we're not on site, the relationship is limited. However, in my experience, the relationship is good.
- Q. And are you familiar with how arrest statistics are reported by PSP?
 - A. Yes, I am.
- Q. Can you describe how these statistics are

recorded?

- A. Calls are generated and assigned into our computer aid dispatch system. Incidents are investigated and stats are automatically uploaded through our records management system. And has this process of statistic reporting changed since Hollywood Casino's since 2019?
- A. The process in general is the same. All the same systems are in place, just locating them in our system is a little bit different for members assigned to the Bureau of Gaming Enforcement.
- Q. And how is the information contained in the Senate Report compiled?
- A. The information is compiled through our records management system and it's confirmed with arrest logs that we maintain at each office.

 They're not subjected to editing. However, if an incident carries over into a new calendar year, those stats won't change, but the verdicts or court decisions could change based off of dispositions.
- Q. And are criminal offenses that occur at Hollywood Casino listed in Exhibit 1?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Does Exhibit 1 state the number of actual offenses which are prosecuted?

A. Yes, they do.

- Q. Have you reviewed the arrest statistics for Hollywood Casino from the time period between 2022 and 2024?
 - A. Yes, I have.
- Q. What is the last date the Senate Report what is the last State Senate Report arrest statistics are available for reported offenses at Hollywood?
 - A. December 2024.
- Q. And can you tell me why the Senate report only lists up to 2024?
- A. This was just based off of changes in the sorting system within our RMS system. Statistics are still searchable. They're maintained in each office and compiled yearly for the annual Senate Reports.
- Q. And what is the most common criminal offense, based on the info provided in Exhibit 1?
 - A. Trespass, theft and disorderly conduct.
- Q. What would constitute a criminal offense at Hollywood Casino?
- A. Any offense under the Title 4, Title 18 offenses and offenses outside of the casino are subject to Title 75.

Q. And can you say how many thefts are reported in an average month?

- A. So there were a total of 32 since opening; that would average less than once a month.
- Q. Are there a significant number of violent crimes at Hollywood Casino?
- A. No. In 2023, there was one aggravated assault and one harassment and in 2024, there were six simple assaults, two terroristic threats, one harassment and five disorderly conducts.
- Q. Are there a significant number of crimes involving individuals under 21 at Hollywood Casino?
- A. No. There was just one reported since opening.
- Q. Has there been a noticeable increase of any specific crime between 2022 and the present?
- A. No. Trespassing and theft are the most consistent crimes, but they're not increasing at any substantial rates.
- Q. And do you see a pattern in the type of actual offenses that have occurred at Hollywood Casino?
- A. No. Trespassing and theft are still the most consistent and the most typical crimes in my experience throughout the casinos across

Pennsylvania.

- Q. During your time in your position, have there been any deviation from the trends in the types of numbers of arrests indicated in the Senate Report?
- A. No. There were 45 total incidents in 2022. Thirty (30) in 2023 and 43 in 2024. Of the 126, 64 were related to a version of theft or trespass. There have been nothing and there's nothing significantly statistically significant regarding the trends and types of incidents of those arrests.
- Q. And overall, is the Pennsylvania State
 Police satisfied with cooperation of the Hollywood
 Casino employees?
- A. Yes. Morgantown, there's been an excellent communication between them and the state police. The employees, they have a great partnership that's been established and PSP has offered to participate in training and exercises with the casino employees to enrich and foster to I'm sorry, to enrich and foster a safe environment. The casino has also been cooperative with aiding PSP investigations and other information.
 - Q. In your opinion, are there any issues or

concerns which would negatively impact Hollywood Casino's suitability for continued licensure?

> No, there's not. Α.

> > ATTORNEY BIZUB: Thank you.

Lieutenant Roane. OEC has no further questions.

23 CALLED AS A WITNESS IN THE FOLLOWING PROCEEDING, AND

24 HAVING PREVIOUSLY BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED AND

25 SAID AS FOLLOWS: 1

THE WITNESS: Good afternoon, Madam Chairman and Board.

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DIRECT EXAMINATION

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BY ATTORNEY BIZUB:

- Q. Can you please state and spell your name for the record?
- 10 A. Yes. It's Wayne Fritzinger, W-A-Y-N-E,
 11 F-R-I-T-Z-I-N-G-E-R.
- Q. And are you employed by the Pennsylvania
 Gaming Control Board?
- 14 A. Yes.
- 15 Q. What is your job title?
 - A. Site Supervisor at Hollywood Morgantown, for the Bureau of Casino Compliance.
- Q. And how long have you been holding the position of Casino Compliance Supervisor?
- A. December 2021, I became a supervisor and I was transferred to Morgantown in April of 2022.
 - Q. Have you previously held any other positions with the Gaming Control Board?
- A. I was a casino compliance representative starting in May of 2009 to December 2021. My

original stop was Hollywood Casino Grantville. Then
I was at Valley Forge in King of Prussia and Sands
or now Wind Creek in Bethlehem.

- Q. And what are your responsibilities as a Compliance Supervisor for Hollywood Casino Morgantown?
- A. I oversee the casino compliance representative staff that are stationed at Morgantown which is six CCRs. This includes granting time off, approving timesheets and introducing any corrective action and compliance with PGCB policy. I review all activities and compliance reports that are submitted by the CCRs.

I am the onsite liaison for the PGCB with the casino. I ensure that the casino is following the internal procedures, internal controls and PGCB regulations are being adhered to and have the CCRS document any reports when issues arise due to violations.

- Q. And what is the role of casino compliance within the casino?
- A. We ensure that the licensed facility is complying with all procedures, internal controls and PGCB regulations are being adhered to and if necessary, reports are documented when issues arise,

we handle patron complaints when they request PGCB involvement. We assist patrons of wanting to place themselves on a self-exclusion list.

- Q. And can you describe the type of access

 BCC (sic) has within Hollywood Casino's surveillance
 and count rooms?
 - A. We have total unfeathered (sic) access.
- Q. And can you describe the access BCC has within Hollywood Casino's central control computer room?
- A. Sure. We have access when necessary in case of an emergency and would be involved, slash, investigate if there was any unauthorized access to the room.
- Q. Can you describe the interactions with the Department of Revenue and BCC?
- A. We received notification from GTAC of any issues including, but not limited to, non-responding slots and investigations. We provide meter readings for RAM cleared machines, present and interact with Department of Revenue when on site for coin testing of new lines for machines.
- Q. And were there any issues with the connectivity regarding central control the central control computer at Hollywood Casino?

- A. None that I'm aware of.
- Q. Was there ever a need for emergency access to the central control computer?
 - A. Not that I'm aware of.
- Q. And does the Bureau of Casino Compliance interact with guests at the casino?
- A. Yes. We meet with the public during floor observations as part of a CCR's daily duties or when requested by a patron for a dispute or complaint.
 - Q. Does BCC respond to their complaints?
- A. Yes.

- Q. Can you tell me how so?
 - A. We look into the complaints, provide appropriate responses in a timely manner and document them in a report.
 - Q. Can you describe the relationship between BCC and members of the Pennsylvania State Police?
 - A. We have limited interaction and it's because, unlike most casinos, we do not have PSP on site. On occasion, when they are on site, we provide them with assistance with our monitoring system and attend any meetings we are requested to be a part of. PSP has the jurisdiction on the gaming floor while the parking lot is Caernarvon

Township's jurisdiction.

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- Q. Can you describe the relationship between BCC and the casino staff?
- A. Sure. We have a good working relationship with the staff at Hollywood Morgantown. We meet with the management as needed and have an open line of communication with them. We also have monthly meetings with all the department heads to make sure we're all on the same page.
- Q. And overall, have the casino staff been cooperative in compliance reviews conducted by BCC?
- A. Yes. They provide full transparency and provide the information we request in a timely manner.
- Q. Are you familiar with the typical regulatory issues found at Pennsylvania casinos?
- A. Yes. In my 16-year career I've worked at numerous properties within three regions.
- 19 Northeast, Central and Southeast.
- Q. And are the regulatory issues that occur at Hollywood, comparable to the regulatory issues at other Pennsylvania casinos?
 - A. Yes.
 - O. What is the most common offense?
 - A. Most common offenses are internal

regulatory and procedure violations, which include but not limited to minor dealer errors, limited surveillance loss, camera retention due to system errors and failure to notify surveillance for jackpot payouts by the cage.

I notify the onsite compliance manager who works diligently and handles any violation insurance compliance is met. And are there any issues or concerns that would negatively impact Hollywood Casino's continued licensure?

A. Not that I'm aware of.

ATTORNEY BIZUB: No further questions. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Mr. King, do you have any follow?

ATTORNEY KING: No follow-up questions. I know that I speak for Michele and the team; we work closely with Casino Compliance. They regulate us carefully but fairly and we appreciate that cooperation.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Do I have any questions from any of our Board Members?

CHAIR SMYLER: I just have just a point of clarification. You said that one of the issues is jackpot payouts not being -? What is

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THE WITNESS: So if somebody's getting a payout for an unclaimed jackpot, sometimes they forget to call surveillance to get, you know, video of the person getting the payout to ensure that compliance is met on it. It's part of the internal control procedures.

8 MR. DERMODY: How is it unclaimed? I 9 don't -.

THE WITNESS: Well, when they're picking it up, like, if somebody forgets their identification, -

MR. DERMODY: Okay.

- they - you have to bring back the identification so they can ensure it's meeting the regulations and IRS standards.

CHAIR SMYLER: Thank you.

- Q. Can you please state and spell your full name for the record?
- A. My name is Elizabeth Kotzmoyer, and my last name is spelled K-O-T-Z-M-O-Y-E-R.
 - Q. Are you employed by the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board?
- 15 A. Yes.
- Q. What is your job title?
- 17 A. I'm an Investigator, slash, Case Agent.
- 18 Q. How long have you held this position?
- A. I've been an Investigator since 2010 and a Case Agent since 2011.
- Q. And have you previously held any other positions with the Gaming Control Board?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. What are your responsibilities as an investigator for the Bureau of Investigations and

Enforcement?

- A. I perform background investigations on any individual applying for a G2 permit, key license or principal license, as well as any company that wants to do business or conduct business in the casinos. And I will also perform miscellaneous investigations on any regulatory issues.
- Q. And what are your responsibilities as a Case Agent for BIE?
- A. As a Case Agent, I'm responsible for conducting the Renewal Investigation for Hollywood Casino Morgantown.
- Q. Did you conduct the investigation of Hollywood Casino for its Slot Machine License Renewal?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. When did BIE begin its renewal investigation into Hollywood Casino?
- 19 A. January 2024.
- Q. And can you describe the scope of the investigation?
 - A. The scope of the investigation include, but was not limited to, the review of the information that was submitted in the application, a review of the report submitted and conducted by the

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- Financial Investigations Unit, a verification review of the liquor license by the Pennsylvania Liquor Control Board, and once those items, among other things, were completed, a Report of Investigation was completed on May 15, 2024.
- Q. When was Hollywood Casino initially licensed?
 - A. June of 2019.
 - Q. And does this investigation include a review of Hollywood Casino from the date of its initial license to present?
- 12 A. Yes.

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- Q. Did BIE review the Renewal Application filed by Hollywood Casino, its principals -
- 15 A. Yes.
- 16 O. entities and affiliates?
- 17 A. Yes.
- Q. Did the investigation include a review of the criminal history?
- 20 A. Yes.
- 21 Q. Civil litigation history?
- 22 A. Yes.
- Q. Tax clearances?
- 24 A. Yes.
- Q. A review of Pennsylvania Gaming Control

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Board regulatory history?

A. Yes.

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- Q. A review of any enforcement actions taken against Hollywood Casino by OEC?
 - A. Yes.
- Q. Has Hollywood Casino been cooperative during this investigation?
 - A. Yes.
 - Q. Is this investigation complete?
- 10 A. Yes.
- Q. Are there any issues or concerns that would negatively impact Hollywood's suitability for continued licensure?
- 14 A. No.
- ATTORNEY BIZUB: Thank you, Ms.
- 16 Kotzmoyer. OEC has no further questions.
- PRESIDING OFFICER: Mr. King, any
- 18 questions?
- 19 ATTORNEY KING: No questions, other
- 20 than, again, I just want to recognize OEC (sic),
- 21 Elizabeth and I know Paul Morrow is somewhere back
- 22 there. OEC and BIE, I should say, also regulate the
- 23 entire company very closely but fairly, and we
- 24 appreciate the relationship that we have with them.
- 25 PRESIDING OFFICER: Any questions

1 from our Board Members? 2 MS. REGAN: No notes. It's very 3 impressive. 4 THE WITNESS: Oh, thank you, ma'am. 5 ATTORNEY BIZUB: OEC has nothing 6 further.; PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay. 8 With that coming to a close, I have 9 one housekeeping matter here before we get to public 10 comment, and that is written public comment received 11 by the Board Clerk. We have one written comment 12 that has to enter into the record because Mr. King 13 entered the other three that we also received. So, we don't need to do that twice. But we have one 14 15 public comment, written public comment received from Richard Schaffer - I'm sorry, Robert Schaffer, Jr., 16 17 and I do believe he's also registered to speak. 18 So, we'll enter that into the record 19 if hearing no objection from OEC or Mr. King? 20 ATTORNEY KING: No objection. 21 Okay. PRESIDING OFFICER: 22 So now we will -. Does anybody need 23 a break? 24 CHAIR SMYLER: No. 25 PRESIDING OFFICER: We'll move to the

public comment portion of today's hearing. I have six registered speakers. As I say your name, if you could just stand up at your chair. Pamela Menet, Brian Sutherland, Christine Folk, Aaron Gantz, Tom Hornberger; don't see Tom Hornberger.

Okay.

And Robert Schaffer, Jr. Is there anybody here that thought they registered to speak and I just not have now called your name? If you could raise your hand? Seeing no hands, I will have the court reporter swear the five of you in now for public comment.

COURT REPORTER: All right. Will
each of you raise your right hand?

PRESIDING OFFICER: As I call your name, if you could please come forward to this chair right here with this microphone to make your comments. Each of you will have about five minutes to speak. And if you're getting close to your - you can sit down - if you're getting close to your five minute time, I'll let you know so you can wrap up your comments for us.

And we will start with Pamela Menet. 1 2 If I mispronounce your name, I apologize right now. 3 MS. MENET: You got it. 4 5 PAMELA MENET, 6 CALLED AS A WITNESS IN THE FOLLOWING PROCEEDING, AND 7 HAVING PREVIOUSLY BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED AND SAID AS FOLLOWS: 9 10 PRESIDING OFFICER: And if you could 11 spell your name for the Court Reporter too, that 12 would be helpful for him. 13 MS. MENET: Yes. Pamela Menet, 14 P-A-M-E-L-A, M-E-N-E-T. 15 Good afternoon. I am the Director of Community and Economic Development for Berks County. 16 I am also a resident of the immediate adjacent 17 Robeson Township and I'm going to add that I'm a 18 19 proud graduate of the local Twin Valley High School. 20 I'm pleased to be here today to offer a few comments on the local share account Category 4 facilities 21 22 program funds that have been brought to Berks 23 County. 24 Now, being able to access funds for

projects in our county has been very important to

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our communities. Amounts and projects that may seem small and insignificant can make a very big difference to our residents and to our municipalities.

We're appreciative of the LS 4 funds awarded since 2023 that have totaled over \$3.2 million to our communities in 45 projects spread across Berks County. I will add that we are including projects - I'm including projects in this number for grant agreements that have not been fully executed and may not show up in any other public record at this point.

These projects include plow trucks, security lighting, community spaces and parks, sewer improvements and public safety vehicles, among many others. In navigating the program's application requirements, one of the most challenging has been the long time period from the application submission deadline until the award decision, sometimes being up to a year.

We do feel that it can hamstring communities because they're unable to start a project any sooner than the grant award date.

Perhaps a practice like the non-prejudicial approval in the PIDA program, Pennsylvania Industrial

Development Authority, which allows eligible expenses to be incurred with preapproval from the Commonwealth and prior to a funding decision or award. It could prove beneficial as communities try to manage contractors and suppliers to holding quotes and being able to start a project in a favorable season.

Again, I want to reiterate the importance of these funds to our communities and to our residents and thank you for allowing me to make these comments on behalf of Berks County.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you. Any questions, comments? Seeing none, thank you very much.

Brian Sutherland?

BRIAN SUTHERLAND,

CALLED AS A WITNESS IN THE FOLLOWING PROCEEDING, AND HAVING PREVIOUSLY BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED AND SAID AS FOLLOWS:

MR. SUTHERLAND: Good afternoon. My name is Brian Sutherland. That's B-R-I-A-N, S-U-T-H-E-R-L-A-N-D. I represent the I Am Able Foundation. We are one of the recipients of the

giving back through the Morgantown Casino. We are grateful for it. We were founded by a third generation U.S. Marine veteran who was diagnosed with a degenerative nerve condition, went from active duty, walking with one cane, two canes, to a wheelchair and now a manual wheelchair and decided that he was going to continue his mission to help empower children and people with disabilities in the community.

We could not do it without people like an organizations like Penn Entertainment here. I just want to read one thing from a mother who is in our program. These are kids who have autism, down syndrome, spina bifida, cerebral palsy. These are kids who aren't going to get picked in the gym class, they aren't going to make a sports team, but they are able to come and do some fitness with us. It's empowering. It's community. It's togetherness and it's support.

This is a mother named Brittany. Her son Ryan is in our program. Ryan wasn't playing with kids at school. He was gaining weight. I know that bullying is going to be a thing in his life because of his special needs. I don't want him to also get bullied because of his weight. Were it not

for the support of organizations like Penn Entertainment, we wouldn't be able to do what we do for these kids, which is so much more than fitness, it's self-esteem, it's friendship, it's belief that they're worthy of being supported in this community.

So, thank you very much to you guys for all that you do. Grateful for you and thank you for the opportunity to share our gratitude.

Christine Folk?

CHRISTINE FOLK,

CALLED AS A WITNESS IN THE FOLLOWING PROCEEDING, AND HAVING PREVIOUSLY BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED AND SAID AS FOLLOWS:

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MS. FOLK: Good afternoon. My name is Christine Folk, C-H-R-I-S-T-I-N-E, F-O-L-K. the Executive Director at Mary's Shelter in Reading. We are a shelter for homeless unaccompanied youth ages 14 to 21. That means the young people in our care have absolutely no adult caregiver in their lives to provide support, guidance or housing.

The one thing I want everybody to know is that these are good kids. These are good kids who have just been dealt a very difficult life situation. They've been abandoned, ignored, abused, or simply just forgotten. And let me give you two examples.

The first young man who ever came to our care woke up one morning, thought he was just going to get ready for school. He came downstairs, saw the note on the table that said the mom's boyfriend and she had moved out of state. Landlord wanted him out by five. Good luck. He was 17. He was just abandoned.

We had a second young man who came to us and he was always raised by his grandmother because his parents had passed away when he was very young. He came home one day from school and found his grandmother passed away. He was 16. He didn't know what to do. He called 911 and simply went with her to the emergency room and then sat there until somebody, a nurse came up and said to him, you know, what are you doing? Where you're going? And he said, I have no idea because I have nobody. So, he came to Mary's Shelter.

These kids are left homeless and alone through no fault of their own. In 2024, we housed 46 youth and additionally, we provide

community outreach service to over 800 low-income families to help prevent homelessness. At Mary's Shelter, the young kids receive a warm, safe and stable environment where they can concentrate on finishing high school and then start thinking about what comes next. Do they want to go to college, trade school, technical school, join the military or enter the workforce?

All the while, when they're with us, we are teaching them the life skills that they need to know to one day become independent and contributing members of our community. That's everything from cooking, cleaning, budgeting, shopping, how to write out an envelope or a check. Some of the basic skills that these kids need to know. The ultimate goal for us, for them, is that they are never homeless again.

Mary's Shelter is an independent nonprofit. We do not have a parent company who will provide us with financial support if ever needed. We rely on individuals, civic groups, congregations and businesses like the Hollywood Casino in Morgantown to continue our work with kids.

Since their opening, the Hollywood Casino in Morgantown has provided Mary's Shelter

with over \$23,650 in monetary, in-kind and special project support. Special projects like our back to school backpacks and our Secret Santa event during the Christmas season. That translates to \$23,650 worth of shelter, heat, clothing and food for kids who were once cold, hungry and homeless.

Mary's Shelter wholeheartedly supports and commends Penn Entertainment and the Hollywood Casino in Morgantown for their commitment to giving back to the community and supporting organizations like Mary's Shelter. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you.

Aaron Gantz?

AARON GANTZ,

CALLED AS A WITNESS IN THE FOLLOWING PROCEEDING, AND HAVING PREVIOUSLY BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED AND SAID AS FOLLOWS:

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MS. GANTZ: Good afternoon, I'm Erin Gantz. A-A-R-O-N, G-A-N-T-Z. I'm the Vice President of Economic Development and Strategy at the Greater Reading Chamber Alliance. It's the organization I'm speaking on behalf of today.

Hollywood Casino Morgantown has been

a valuable economic driver in Berks County,
particularly through the local share account
program, which you've heard a lot about today.
Since its establishment, over \$18 million in LSA
grant awards have been awarded across our community
supporting critical community projects, economic
development initiatives and infrastructure
improvements.

Our organization has received LSA funds to support an important infrastructure project, the return of Passenger Rail, and doing the local work to support that infrastructure enhancement. We hope we'll be here in the next couple of years.

These funds have had a direct impact on strengthening our region, driving investment and enhancing local opportunities. GRCA fully supports Hollywood Casino Morgantown and recognizes its role in fostering economic growth in our community. I appreciate your time this afternoon and wish the casino continued success. Thank you.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you. Robert Schaffer, Jr.

ROBERT SCHAFFER, JR.,

CALLED AS A WITNESS IN THE FOLLOWING PROCEEDING, AND HAVING PREVIOUSLY BEEN DULY SWORN, TESTIFIED AND SAID AS FOLLOWS:

MR. SCHAFFER: Good afternoon. This is Robert L. Schaffer, Jr. The spelling is S-C-H-A-F-F-E-R, and the prefix is Junior. The following is a statement in opposition to the recertification of Mountainview Thoroughbred Racing Association, LLC, operator of Hollywood Casino in Morgantown. I am in opposition of the renewal of the license.

The casino is partnered with Espnbet.com and Hollywoodcasino.com, formerly known as Barstool. The iGaming accepts deposits on the Hollywood Casino Morgantown property. ESPN BET accepted wagers for games with illegal rulesets not authorized by the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board, including Phillies All Blackjack - Phillies All Bets Blackjack Live on September 20th, 2024 and Infinite Blackjack on December 14th, 2024.

These cases were investigated by PGCB investigators Mike Donati and Hollywood Casino Morgantown Site Supervisor Wayne Fritzinger respectively. On 9/20/2024, PGCB surrender clause

6338.9 was violated. Also, Zendesk was altered by ESPN BET in January and February of 2025 and the case was investigated by PGCB Investigator Christopher Farris. Their iGaming has a history of telling me and others that they self-excluded themselves when they have not.

Penn Entertainment is operating sports books on their properties including Hollywood Casino Morgantown that accept deposits, use Tri-Gaming and has a history of withholding funds for days or even weeks for me under the false pretense that I have self-excluded. It is the responsibility of a casino corporation to identify self-excluded individuals by their correct profile information and Social Security number.

The company has a history of neglecting to do so and therefore their certification should be suspended or terminated by the Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board. Barstool Sportsbook Online, now known as ESPN BET and associated with Hollywood Casino in Morgantown, incorrectly informed me of a property self-exclusion twice, once from May 14, 2021 and the other July 14, 2023.

Pennsylvania Gaming Control Board

Investigators Thomas Wascura and Christopher Farris conducted investigations into subsidiaries of Hollywood Casino falsely stating to me that I self-excluded at a Hollywood Casino property and it was deemed the company mixed my identity up with someone else's.

Furthermore, Hollywood Casino

Morgantown when attempting to handle the impacts of
the situation in 2025 failed and I was evicted from
the Grantville property by security on March 27,
2025. On May 14, 2001, Jason K. from Barstool
iGaming stated, thanks, I see that your account has
been locked due to you having self-excluded from one
of our casinos. Once you self-exclude from one of
our properties, you will be excluded from all
properties. I replied, no, I haven't self-excluded.
There appears to be a mistake.

On May 14, 2021, Patrick from

Barstool Sportsbook stated, apologies about this. I

am seeing that the previous agents that you have

chatted with have escalated us to our risk team for

review. Unfortunately, we do not have an update on

this currently, but for these exclusions the

ultimate decision is made by your state's gaming

control board. Until they are able to lift the ban,

we, unfortunately, are unable to do anything further.

On May 24, 2021, Kayleigh stated,
Penn National Gaming as a whole oversees the
Sportsbook and these slots. On July 24, 2023, Matt
K. from Barstool Sportsbook stated, unfortunately,
someone with the same name or close to the same name
who has the same birthday is excluded and our system
may have locked your account in error. I will
escalate this to our compliance team who reviews
these potential error locks every few days and will
remove the lock after they complete the review.

An additional accusation of selfExclusion occurred on April 1st, 2025. This shows a pattern of behavior by Penn Entertainment and its affiliates spanning 2021 through the year 2025. And I would like to submit all evidence to the Pennsylvania Gaining Control Board after the testimony. Thank you. I appreciate that you held this meeting today.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Thank you. And I will call Tom Hornberger again if he appeared. Is there a Tom Hornberger?

MS. RALSTON: I do have a question.

25 Are we allowed?

PRESIDING OFFICER: Yes. You're a Commissioner, you can ask a question.

MS. RALSTON: I just wanted to know if this is like a - happening with a - based on a glitch in the system or is this something that you've seen on a regular basis where it could be misidentification?

ATTORNEY KING: So I don't want to go deep into something personal on the record.

MS. RALSTON: Yeah.

ATTORNEY KING: I'll just say one of the benefits of regulated gaming is that there is a dispute resolution process through the Board to have a fair and impartial person look at it and what had happened there. And I believe the Board has taken a look at it and we appreciate the Board doing that.

PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay.

Again, is there anyone here that thought they registered to speak or were here to speak today and I have not called your name, raise your hand. Seeing no hands, Hollywood Casino, Mr. King, do you have any closing remarks?

ATTORNEY KING: I'll keep it very brief. I think it's clear through just about all the testimony, obviously, Mr. Hornberger - or Mr.

Schaffer excluded, that this project has been a great success since its opening. And I'll just - quick story about how close this almost didn't happen. I was telling Michele and Alex, you know, in March of 2020, I remember being basically locked in my third floor bedroom in my house, thinking that our entire gaming industry was about to disappear. Not only in Pennsylvania, but nationally, which wasn't a great feeling since a lot of it is what I do professionally, is representing gaming companies.

And Penn, then Penn National before we changed the name, like all the other national operators, it was a very trying and scary time. And just in those few weeks were in the process of basically doing everything possible to not go out of business. And we had just laid off 25,000 people across the country. There's a skeleton team in Wyomissing trying to stay open.

This project had just broken ground at the end of 2019. And we were basically trying to do everything that we could to raise money so that we could keep the bare minimum lights on. And this property got sold. And so we don't own the property anymore. It's not a problem. It's our longstanding partner at GLPI, but we sold this property. We sold

property we owned in Las Vegas.

We did a lot of other different things to raise money. We worked really closely with the staff of the Gaming Control Board because there were a lot of regulatory issues, and we were able to raise money to just keep the lights on, get through the pandemic. And as soon as we could, after everything settled out, we came back here and we got the workers back on site and we built the project.

And I think we're really proud of keeping our promise with respect to getting this done. It's a really great story. A lot of people don't know how close it came. And it occurred to me when I think Michele pointed out that this site had a plan to have a shopping center there, but it didn't happen because of the economic crisis in '07-'08. So, the fact that the company was able to shepherd this through, make it through such a difficult trying time, I think is really something.

But look, let's get back to just the basics. Should the license be renewed? And I know this is a preliminary hearing, we'll be back in Harrisburg in a few months for the final, but I think you've heard all the right things that the

Commissioners need to hear. I think the property is clearly well managed, it's well run. There's a great team here led by Michele.

They're doing all the things they need to do to run it professionally and well, and generate, not only tax revenue for the Commonwealth, but all the local share monies. And you've heard what a great benefit is because into this township and the county and all the projects it's supporting, great workforce, diverse workforce. And so it's a great success.

And when you get to that point of decision making, and we'll be back before you and I'll make this request again, we'll respectfully request that we be relicensed. And thank you for your time and thank you also to the Township for hosting the meeting today.

PRESIDING OFFICER: OEC Counsel?

ATTORNEY BIZUB: Nothing. Thank you.
PRESIDING OFFICER: Okay.

The record will remain open until the board hears the matter at a later public Board Meeting. I'll prepare a report based upon the testimony and evidence entered into the record today. That report will be sent to the Board along

with the transcript and all the exhibits, the Application and the Suitability Report, that will be generated. And at the Board's convenience, at a later date, they will schedule the matter to be heard again.

I want to thank the staff here at
Caernarvon Township and the Chief of Police and his
staff for their assistance in holding this hearing
today. And hopefully we'll be back in another five
or six years. I won't personally be back, but some
of you might be back. And so thank you all for
coming today, your cooperation. The hearing is now
adjourned.
